EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Orrin G. Hatch Center for Legislative Leadership and Public Policy Studies, in affiliation with the University of Utah, will benefit the University while also honoring the legacy of Senator Orrin Hatch. The Center will promote understanding of bipartisan government and the legislative process, inspire public service, and help train the next generation of citizen leaders with the tools of statesmanship and collaborative policy making.

The Mission and Objectives of the Center will work to enhance and expand the already critical missions of the Hinckley Institute of Politics and the Kem C. Gardner Policy Institute—while at the same time filling a vacant but necessary space in the public policy sphere. The Hatch Foundation will have sole responsibility for raising funds to construct the building and establish endowments for the operating and maintenance costs of the building and for staff and for programming.

FOUNDATION MISSION

The mission of the Orrin G. Hatch Foundation is four-fold:

- Honor and celebrate the Senator's legacy of public service and bipartisanship
- Promote thoughtful political engagement
- Advance practical solutions to current public policy challenges
- Restore statesmanship, civility and cooperative achievement to the American political landscape

The Foundation will achieve this mission primarily through the establishment and operations of The Orrin G. Hatch Center for Legislative Leadership and Public Policy Studies (The Hatch Center) in affiliation with the University of Utah. The Foundation's main function is to raise all necessary funds to ensure the Center's full endowment and ability to fulfill its mission. The Foundation Board oversees the Center's mission and operations, execution of the Center's five major objectives, and directs the Center's expenditures. The Foundation Board is the owner of the Center, the Hatch Collection, and the Center's other assets until such time that they are donated to, and accepted by, the University of Utah.

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THE ORRIN G. HATCH CENTER FOR LEGISLATIVE LEADERSHIP & PUBLIC POLICY STUDIES

Through establishing the new Hatch Center, we will honor the legacy of Senator Hatch by working to promote understanding of bipartisan government and the legislative process, inspiring public service, and training the next generation of citizen leaders with the tools of statesmanship and collaborative policy making.

The Foundation is in discussions to affiliate this new Hatch Center with the University of Utah, the state's flagship university and a major research university. The Foundation will have sole responsibility for raising funds to construct the Hatch Center building and endow the staff, the Center, the research and educational programs, and the publications. The Hatch Center will have a five-member board, including the President of the University of Utah, to oversee and direct the Center's operations and activities. The Foundation board oversees the mission and operations of the Center, execution of the Center's five major objectives, and directs expenditures in the achievement of the Center's goals.

Once Senator Hatch officially leaves the Senate, the Foundation will maintain ownership of the Senator's historic collection accumulated throughout his public service. Through affiliation with the Center, the University can make the Senator's papers available to the general public, scholars, professors, and students for research for educational and historical purposes.

THE PROPRIETARY OBJECTIVES OF THE HATCH CENTER

The Hatch Center will fill a necessary but vacant space in the public policy landscape of Utah through the following five functions:

- 1 Maintain the library and archive for Senator Hatch's official Senate papers and records, along with the Senator's personal effects spanning his 42 years in the United States Senate.
- 2 Promote an immersive study of the legislative process through access to the Center's extensive archives with educational programs for high school and college students, scholars, public servants and the broader community.
- 3 Rebrand bipartisan thinking as a constitutionally-based alternative to divisive partisan politics with scholarly research, guest speakers, dialogues and debates, panels, presentations and other public events that reflect the diversity of viewpoints on local and nationally relevant issues.
- 4 Make bipartisan lawmaking politically viable by providing the tools of statesmanship, with trainings in rhetorical arguments, collaboration, negotiation, strategic communication, civil engagement, and policy marketing.
- 5 Work with Senator Hatch to publish his memoirs of his experience in Washington D.C., his views on the Constitution, and of his involvement in the legislative process.

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1 The Hatch Library & Archives

The Hatch Center will maintain the Senator's collected papers, legislative documents, and other materials. This collection is considered one of the most significant collections in modern political history and is the subject of frequent scholarly interest.

In addition to legislative records, the Library will also offer access to Senator Hatch's personal letters, press documents, campaign material, personal memorabilia, and gifts the Senator has received. The Hatch Center will provide access to this entire collection through a user-friendly library for use by students, academic researchers, and the general public.

2 An Immersive Study of the Legislative Process

The Hatch Center will be a place of teaching and learning, with offerings that include academic courses, research grants, student internship and fellowship opportunities, and a range of scholarly publications focused on effective legislative activity.

It will also include an outreach program to junior high and high school students dedicated to educating them about the important role of the Senate, the legislative process, and to encourage them to become active in our democracy, public policy making, and in the legislative process.

3 Rebrand Bipartisan Thinking

The Hatch Center will work with nationally recognized scholars to develop position papers on critical issues facing the nation in a variety of public policy realms. We will seek to promote constructive policy development in Congress, in Utah's Legislature, in county and city councils, and in school boards across the State. Re-enshrining constitutionally-based, bipartisan lawmaking as the instinctive norm will equip future generations of engaged citizens with the understanding to be effective public servants and leaders of our state and country.

The Hatch Center will draw on the Senator's legacy as a lawmaker and his extensive political relationships to host prominent speakers and roundtable discussions, organize public debates and scholarly panels, and participate in a variety of other national events with the aim of helping citizens and policymakers make better, wiser, and more informed policy decisions.

4 Politically Viable Bipartisan Lawmaking

The Senator strongly believes that Utah and the country's future depends on inspiring talented, motivated leaders. But effective leaders require effective tools. Thus, the Hatch Center will develop programs to provide the tools of statesmanship and training in collaboration, negotiation, strategic communication, civil engagement, and policy marketing to state and federal legislators, students, and engaged citizens.

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These courses will be offered through a branch office in Washington, D.C., not just to lawmakers, but also administrative and policy staff. The result will be less rhetoric and more principle-driven negotiation, bipartisan policy innovation, civic engagement, and strategic policy marketing and promotion.

5 The Hatch Memoirs

The Hatch Center in conjunction with the University of Utah, will assist Senator Hatch in writing and publishing his memoirs. Senator Hatch holds the record of having passed more legislation than any other Senator alive today, authorizing 112 bills and co-sponsoring 638 bills that have become law.

Beyond the sheer volume of his legislative successes, the Senator has authored many of the most consequential laws of the past four decades of both national and local significance. His absolute commitment to the rule of law and his efforts towards bipartisan lawmaking are a model for all current and future policy makers. Combined with his most salient experiences in Washington, his memoirs will be an important addition to the libraries of modern political history.

PARTNERSHIPS & COLLABORATIVE OBJECTIVES OF THE HATCH CENTER

The University of Utah is already home to two leading public policy organizations that provide essential leadership in unique areas. The Hinckley Institute's mission focuses on engaging students and the public in transformative experiences and impactful programs as well as providing political thought leadership. The Gardner Institute develops and shares the economic, demographic and public policy data needed to help individuals and communities make informed policy decisions.

The Hatch Center will synthesize the political thought leadership of the Hinckley Institute, the research of the Gardner Institute, and the work of other departments and colleges at the University—and other leaders in public policy—to promote and advance bipartisan, constitutionally-sound, passable public policy solutions. Our efforts will enhance and expand the collaborative tenets of our various missions.

Additionally, the Center will coordinate with the University to partner with private and public universities and colleges throughout Utah to provide access to the Hatch Collection, for both scholarly research and public presentations.

In this light, the Center will work closely with the Hinckley Institute of Politics in

- advancing and promoting bipartisan solutions to state and local policy issues
- providing students with internship opportunities
- developing and co-sponsoring lectures, debates, and symposiums
- jointly offering educational opportunities for students, scholars, and the general public
- helping elevate the level of public discourse regarding difficult public issues

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The Center will also work closely with the Kem C. Gardner Policy Institute in

- utilizing economic and demographic research to better understand the market for bipartisan public policy
- presenting invigorating civil discourse, thought provoking speakers, and developing white papers on important public policy issues
- developing programs emphasizing the value of critical skills such as teamwork, leadership, compromise, debating, and persuasion
- developing curriculum for PhD. programs, fellowships, internships or mock senate programs, and high school programs that focus on bipartisan lawmaking and negotiation strategies

The Center will develop joint programs and exhibits with the S.J. Quinney College of Law

- promoting better understanding of the Constitution, the judicial process, and the appointing of Supreme Court Justices
- teaching, researching, and preserving the legislative legacy of Senator Hatch through scholarly legal research and educational opportunities for both students of the college and the community at large

THE HATCH CENTER BUILDING

The Center will be housed in a new facility constructed across the street to the east of the Thomas S. Monson Center and the Gardner Institute on South Temple Street and D Street. This ideal location will offer proximity to important community resources, the Gardner Institute, the University of Utah, the Capitol, and downtown businesses. With its location on historic South Temple, the Hatch Center will synergize with leading thought organizations that also line the road from the University of Utah to downtown Salt Lake City.

The Hatch Center building will provide a stunning lobby space that welcomes visitors and scholars alike. The building will include a replica of the Senator's personal senate office and a display area to show the Senator's personal memorabilia and gifts. It will also be fully functional, with well-appointed offices for the co-directors, space for administrative staff, a gallery and meeting rooms, and areas for students and scholars to review and study the Senator's papers.

FINANCIAL SUMMARY

This financial summary outlines the anticipated costs associated with the creation of the Hatch Center. The Hatch Foundation will have the responsibility to raise these funds to pay for the building, endow for the operating and maintenance costs of the building, and establish endowments for staff and for programming. In addition, the Hatch Foundation will continue to raise money for the Hatch Center as needed.

Trent Christensen was hired as Director of the Foundation in December 2017. Trent has served in a leadership capacity with numerous non-profit organizations, most recently as Vice President of Development for the Goldwater Institute, and as Vice President of Donor Development and General Counsel at Leader.org prior to that. He raised \$90 million as Regional Finance Director for the Romney Presidential campaign from 2011-2012.

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SUMMARY

The Center will benefit students and faculty, scholars and public officials, and local and national citizens in developing future leaders.

It will offer civic education programs for teachers, students, and the public, conduct strategic leadership development training, and encourage participatory democracy. It will lead invigorating civil discourse, undertaking research on pressing public issues, and bring in national speakers for discussions and debates—all with the aim of educating future leaders and of helping citizens and policymakers make informed and wise policy decisions.

The University will also have the option to accept the donation of the Center, its assets, and the Senator's Collection once the Senator ceases his duties as the Center's Executive Director, with the exception of any personal items from the Collection that the Senator or his family may reclaim. Thus, the University will have a unique opportunity to have the Hatch Center become part of the University community while protecting the University from any financial hardship.

The Center will offer experiences and programs that will provide insight into and appreciation for the role of government and the responsibilities of citizenship in this great state and nation. It will give a glimpse into Senator Hatch's career and personality, and allow visitors to see his papers, letters, and treasured mementos and learn about the values, people, and ideas he held most dear.

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

INTRODUCING THE HATCH CENTER

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ORRIN G. HATCH
FOUNDATION



The Orrin G. Hatch Foundation was established to honor the Senator's legacy and promote thoughtful political engagement through a center for public policy and legislative studies affiliated with a major research university. The Hatch Center will function as a research library, a forum for political discussions and policy scholarship and a place of civic engagement for students and the broader community.

1. Library and Archive for Official Senate Papers

The Hatch Center will serve as a repository for the Senator's collected papers, legislative documents, and other materials—one of the most significant collections in the modern Senate. Senator Hatch ranks among the longest-serving Senators in history, having served alongside six Presidents and nine Senate Majority Leaders. He has spent 29 of 39 years in Congress as either Chairman or Ranking Member of a major committee—an unparalleled record. Additionally, he has authored more legislation than any other contemporary officeholder. For nearly two decades, an archivist has carefully preserved more than 3,000 boxes of legislative records and other materials for the Senator. It is a collection of great historical significance and is the subject of frequent scholarly interest. The Hatch Center will provide a user-friendly library for use by both academic researchers and the general public.

2. Institute for Public Policy and Civic Engagement

The Hatch Center will house an institute to promote serious discussion of political issues and public policies. Throughout his time in Washington, Senator Hatch has been a thought leader on a wide variety of policy issues, ranging from tax reform and international trade to health innovation and criminal justice. As the author of numerous significant legislation over the past four decades, Senator Hatch's name is synonymous with policy development and legislative leadership. The Center will draw on Senator Hatch's legacy as a lawmaker and his extensive political relationships to host prominent speakers and roundtable discussions, organize public debates and scholarly panels, and participate in a variety of other national events—all with an aim of helping citizens and policymakers make informed and wise policy decisions.

3. Study of Bipartisanship and the Legislative Process

The Hatch Center will engage in both scholarly and practical study of the legislative process, seeking to promote constructive policy development in Washington and equip future generations of public servants and engaged citizens. As the most effective bipartisan lawmaker in the past four decades, Senator Hatch has authored or co-sponsored over 750 bills that have become law, placing him among the most prolific legislators in American history. The Center will draw on his experience and contacts to promote the study of the legislative process and identify opportunities for bipartisan lawmaking success. Beyond housing documents and historical effects, the Center will be a place of teaching and learning, with offerings that include undergraduate courses, graduate seminars, academic fellowships, research grants, student internship opportunities, and a range of scholarly publications focused on effective legislative activity.

B I O G R A P H Y

Senator Orrin G. Hatch was sworn in as the President Pro Tempore of the United States Senate on January 6, 2015. As a member of the Senate for nearly 40 years, Senator Hatch is the longest-serving officeholder in Utah history. He has served during the administrations of six Presidents—three Republicans and three Democrats—and alongside nine Senate Majority Leaders—four Democrats and five Republicans. Senator Hatch is currently the 9th longest-serving U.S. Senator in history, and at the end of his current term, he will have served as a Republican Senator longer than anyone else in American history.

Senator Hatch holds the record of having passed more legislation than any other Senator alive today. In doing so, Senator Hatch has earned a reputation as one of the most effective and bipartisan lawmakers of all time authoring 112 bills, and co-sponsoring 638 bills, that have become law.

Beyond the sheer volume of his legislative successes, Senator Hatch has authored many of the most consequential laws of the past four decades, including: the Drug Price Competition and Patent Term Restoration Act (known as “Hatch-Waxman”), which created the modern generic drug industry; the State Children’s Health Insurance Program, which provides health care for uninsured children from low-income families who do not qualify for Medicaid; the Americans with Disabilities Act, which prohibits discrimination against and requires accommodations for persons with disabilities; the Protecting Americans from Tax Hikes Act, which makes responsible tax relief provisions permanent for both businesses and individuals; and the Religious Freedom Restoration Act, which holds the government accountable for ensuring the free exercise of religion.

In addition to the integral role he has played in writing and passing some of the nation’s most significant legislation during the last 40 years, Senator Hatch has also helped enact laws of particular importance to fellow Utahns, including the Radiation Exposure Compensation Act, the Central Utah Water Project, and the Utah Schools and Lands Improvement Act.

Throughout his service, Senator Hatch has had the distinction of holding numerous leadership positions. He is one of only a few senators in history to have served as Chairman of three major Senate Committees: the Labor and Human Resources Committee (now called the Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions Committee, 1981 to 1987), the Judiciary Committee (1995 to 2001 and 2003 to 2005), and the Finance Committee (2015 to present). Senator Hatch has thus far spent 29 of 39 years in Congress as either Chairman or Ranking Member of a major committee—an unparalleled record.

Senator Hatch has used these leadership positions to advance measures to protect our nation’s free-market economy, individual liberty, and America’s system of limited government under the Constitution. As Chairman of the Finance Committee, Senator Hatch’s priorities have included pro-growth tax reform, opening up foreign markets to American exports, entitlement reform to ensure the long-term sustainability

of Social Security and Medicare, and repealing and replacing Obamacare. His record of fiscal responsibility earned him the nickname “Mr. Balanced Budget” from President Reagan.

On the Judiciary Committee, Senator Hatch has been instrumental in fighting judicial activism and reshaping the federal courts. He has worked tirelessly for effective criminal laws, civil justice reform, property rights protections, fighting obscenity and child pornography, high-skilled immigration reform and numerous measures related to technological innovation and intellectual property.

On the Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions Committee, Senator Hatch has been instrumental in passing laws related to health innovation, cancer and HIV/AIDS research, pharmaceuticals, dietary supplements, mental health, disability rights, national service, education innovation and children’s welfare.

In addition to his formal leadership positions, Senator Hatch has long been regarded as one of our nation’s most distinguished statesmen who—even before election by his colleagues as President Pro Tempore of the Senate—played a prominent role in revitalizing the Senate’s historic traditions, safeguarding its rules and precedents and defending its institutional prerogatives.

Senator Hatch has received numerous awards and honors, including 14 honorary degrees from institutions such as the University of Pittsburgh, the University of Maryland, Pepperdine University, the University of Utah, and Utah State University. In addition to honorary degrees, he has received the National Intelligence Distinguished Public Service Medal from the Director of National Intelligence, an honorary Grammy award, and Gold and Platinum Records from the Recording Industry Association of America.

Senator Hatch credits his family as instrumental to his success. He and his wife, Elaine, have been married for more than fifty years. Together, they are the proud parents of six children, 23 grandchildren, and 16 great-grandchildren.





Senator Hatch's official and personal records have significant practical and historical value. Under the direction of a professional archivist, Senator Hatch's staff has worked to preserve these records by following high-standard archival procedures. The Orrin G. Hatch Congressional Papers Collection is the culmination of this effort.

The Collection presents a comprehensive history of Senator Hatch's legislative achievements over nearly four decades of public service. It includes thousands of documents in all formats and media. Once made available for research, the Collection will be an extensive repository of information illuminating some of the most critical legislative developments in modern American history. The records will also serve as an invaluable resource to historians, biographers, political scientists, economists, sociologists, the legal community and the general public.

Of special note is the Foundation's vast compilation of legislative records, which constitute nearly half of all documents contained in the Collection. These materials include bills, amendments, memoranda, letters and speeches related to some of the most critical legislative undertakings of the last half-century. Researchers will have unprecedented access to investigate Congress's role in significant historical developments, such as the Iran-Contra investigation, the Clinton impeachment proceedings and the confirmation proceedings of 12 Supreme Court Justices.

Of equal value are documents from the Senator's service on various Senate committees, including: the Judiciary Committee; the Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions Committee; the Finance Committee; the Select Committee on Intelligence; and the Special Committee on Aging. These records will offer scholars an unparalleled view into the legislative proceedings that led to the passage of historic laws such as the Medicare prescription drug benefit, the USA PATRIOT Act, the Religious Freedom Restoration Act, the Americans with Disabilities Act, and the Economic Recovery Tax Act of 1981. Moreover, the documents offer unique insight into some of the fiercest legislative battles of the past four decades, including Obamacare, immigration reform, the Contract with America, and the labor law reform efforts of the late 1970s.

In addition to legislative records, the library will also offer access to Senator Hatch's personal letters, press documents, campaign materials, and other effects. Some representative items found among the Senator's personal memorabilia include:

- Personal notes, meeting minutes, and internal memoranda relating to the confirmation hearings for Robert Bork, Justice Clarence Thomas, and virtually every judicial nominee over the past 40 years;

 - A copy of H. Res. 611, the Resolution of Impeachment of President Clinton, signed by all of the House Impeachment Managers;
 - An original copy of Justice Anthony Kennedy's first draft and handwritten notes from the dissenting opinion in *National Federation of Independent Businesses v. Sebelius*, the 2012 Supreme Court case on the constitutionality of Obamacare;
 - A telegram from Ronald Reagan endorsing Senator Hatch in the 1976 Utah Republican Senate primary—Reagan's only known pre-primary endorsement throughout his entire public career;
 - Private correspondence between Senator Hatch and Senator Ted Kennedy on issues arising during negotiations over landmark legislation to address children's health;
 - A painting by the late Senator Ted Kennedy of the Hyannis Port seascape, one of many personal gifts from Senator Kennedy, a close friend and colleague of Senator Hatch;
 - Artifacts from Senator Hatch's mission to Angola in 1986, including metal plates with Cyrillic lettering taken by UNITA fighters from captured artillery pieces and rocket launchers, proving that the Soviet Union was providing weapons to the Marxist faction in the country's civil war; and
 - A personal letter from former First Lady Nancy Reagan expressing her heartfelt support for stem cell research, the content of which was especially influential in encouraging Senator Hatch's own support for legislation to fund stem cell research.

Access to this vast array of materials will be granted to both scholars and the general public. Thanks to Senator Hatch's critical role in so many of the pivotal events of the last forty years, the Collection will be a crowning feature of the Hatch Center—one of its enduring contributions to historical scholarship and popular memory of the late twentieth and early twenty-first centuries.

CAREER AT A GLANCE

Responding to the 1995 Oklahoma City bombing as well as the rampant abuse of the federal courts to undermine the death penalty, Hatch coauthors the bipartisan Antiterrorism and Effective Death Penalty Act. The first comprehensive legislation to protect against the threat of terrorism, to this day the Act remains a cornerstone of efforts to fight crime and terrorism.

Leads the effort to pass legislation to improve and simplify the tax code for small businesses, particularly S-corporations. Many of the provisions enacted in the Small Business Job Protection Act were Hatch-led initiatives.

..... 1997

Responding to the needs of Utah families ineligible for Medicaid but unable to afford private health insurance, coauthors the State Children's Health Insurance Program, often known as S-CHIP. Hatch's commitment to fiscal responsibility and federalism led him to craft the program on the basis of block grants empowering the states.

Helps lead passage of the Religious Liberty and Charitable Donation Protection Act, which protects the tax-status of charitable donations to religious institutions.

Introduces the Missing, Exploited, and Runaway Children Protection Act, which was signed into law. This law provides funding for the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children and reauthorizes the Runaway and Homeless Youth Act.

..... 2000

Helps lead passage of the Religious Land Use and Institutionalized Persons Act as a response to the Supreme Court's ruling that the Religious Freedom Restoration Act could not be applied to states. This legislation prevents state and local land use and zoning regulations from imposing undue burdens on religious institutions.

..... 2001

Following the horrific September 11th terrorist attacks, as the Chairman of the Judiciary Committee, Hatch helps craft the USA PATRIOT Act to prevent another large-scale attack.

..... 2002

Helps pass the National Amber Alert law that revolutionized efforts to find missing children.

Writes the Drug Treatment, Education, and Prevention Act—a law that places appropriate emphasis on prosecution of repeat, violent offenders and drug traffickers. The law also enhances treatment for non-violent and first-time offenders and education to discourage drug use.

..... 2003

Authors and leads passage of the Prosecutorial Remedies and Other Tools to End the Exploitation of Children Today (PROTECT) Act. This law simplified prosecution of pedophiles and child pornographers.

Helps negotiate the final version of the Prescription Drug and Medicare Improvement Act—the largest change to Medicare since its inception. The Act includes a number of Hatch-written provisions, including boosting physician reimbursement rates in rural areas, reducing the paperwork and regulatory burdens on physicians and other Medicare providers, and initiating a healthcare quality study by the Institute of Medicine.



Fights to pass the Partial-Birth Abortion Ban Act to ban the gruesome procedure known as partial-birth abortion.

2005

Establishes a National Cord Blood Stem Cell Bank Network to prepare, store, and distribute human umbilical-cord blood stem cells for the treatment of patients, and to support peer-reviewed research using such cells. This law significantly increases a patient's chance of finding a suitable genetic match when faced with a grave disease.

2006

Works for the passage of the Adam Walsh Child Protection and Safety Act to help locate the whereabouts of convicted predators. This law creates a national database that requires convicted sex offenders to register and report their location.

2007

Authors and leads the negotiations for the Biologics Price Competition and Innovation Act, which provides a balance of innovation and generic competition for the bio-technology industry, providing 12 years of exclusivity.

2009

Honors his longtime friend Senator Ted Kennedy (D-MA) by passing the Serve America Act, a call to action to expand more national and community-based service opportunities for all Americans. The legislation encourages individuals of all ages to serve their communities; it also supports social entrepreneurs with innovative solutions to tackle our most pressing problems.

2011

With then-Senate Finance Committee Chairman Max Baucus (D-MT), Hatch introduces the State Child Welfare Innovation Act to make improvements to various child welfare programs, and provide for limited state demonstration projects to improve outcomes for children and families. Major provisions of this bill passed as part of the Child and Family Services Improvement and Innovation Act.

2012

Introduces the WIN for Children and Families Act, which requires states to demonstrate how they are prohibiting Electronic Benefit Transfer (EBT) cards from being used in casinos, liquor stores, and strip clubs. The bill passes as part of the Middle Class Tax Relief and Job Creation Act of 2012.

Helps lead the effort to make permanent the 2001 and 2003 tax cuts in the American Taxpayer Relief Act.

2015

After years of Congress passing fiscally irresponsible patches known as the "doc fix," helps pass the Medicare Access and CHIP Reauthorization Act, a bipartisan bill that permanently repeals and replaces the Medicare's physician reimbursement formula with an improved payment system that rewards quality, efficiency, and innovation so seniors and doctors alike will no longer have to worry about annual crises undermining Medicare. The bill is fully paid for with provisions described as a "down payment" on long-term entitlement reform.

Leads the vigorous battle to pass bipartisan Trade Promotion Authority (TPA). The legislation establishes concrete rules for international trade negotiations to help the United States deliver strong, high-standard trade agreements that will boost American exports and create new economic opportunities and better jobs for American workers, manufacturers, farmers, ranchers, and entrepreneurs. TPA gives the American people a voice in international trade talks and empowers Congress to ensure America's priorities are met.

According to *National Journal*, Senator Hatch has passed more laws than any other Senator in modern times. Over 750 of his bills have been enacted into law. The following is a brief catalogue of Senator Hatch's most significant accomplishments during his four decades of service in the United States Senate:

..... 1978

Leads the filibuster against the Labor Law Reform Act which would have strangled key protections, like "right-to-work" provisions protected under the Taft-Hartley Act. Hatch's efforts dramatically culminate in a record six unsuccessful cloture votes.

..... 1979

Introduces the Balanced Budget Amendment for the first time, beginning his leadership of a career-long fight to amend the Constitution to require a balanced federal budget. Hatch's reputation as a statesman and his record of fiscal responsibility later earns him the nickname "Mr. Balanced Budget" from President Ronald Reagan.

..... 1982

As the Chairman of the Judiciary Subcommittee on the Constitution, authors the seminal report, "The Right to Keep and Bear Arms." This pioneering legal analysis confirms that the Second Amendment was intended as an individual right to gun ownership more than two decades before the Supreme Court affirmed that position. The report is now credited with laying the groundwork for 20 years of judicial and legislative efforts to protect Americans' Second Amendment rights.

..... 1984

Helps create the modern generic drug industry after joining Congressman Henry Waxman (D-CA) to negotiate passage of the Drug Price Competition and Patent Term Restoration Act, commonly referred to as the Hatch-Waxman Act. This law promotes the sale of generic drugs while leaving intact a financial incentive for pharmaceutical companies to continue research and development. Since Hatch-Waxman became law, it has since been credited with propelling the generic drug market and saving consumers millions of dollars.

.....
Helps pass the National Organ Transplant Act, simplifying the bureaucratic process that patients must go through to obtain life-saving transplants.

..... 1985

Achieves yet another victory for patients by leading passage of the Orphan Drug Act Amendments of 1985. This legislation strengthens the original act passed in 1983, which created incentives for private researchers to devote resources to treatments and cures for rare disorders. Before the 1985 law, fewer than ten treatments for these rare disorders came to market; now, thousands of orphan drug designations have been granted.

..... 1986

As a leading proponent of Second Amendment rights, Hatch leverages his position as Chairman of the Subcommittee on the Constitution to secure passage of the Firearms Owners' Protection Act, rolling back decades of anti-gun laws and regulations.

★

1989

After President Bush nominates Clarence Thomas to fill a vacancy on the Supreme Court, Hatch rushes to the justice's defense after several Democratic members of Congress attack Thomas's character. As a senior member of the Senate Judiciary Committee, Hatch launches a full-scale defense of Thomas on national television, which was instrumental in vindicating Thomas's reputation and eventually led to his confirmation.

1990

Joins Senator Ted Kennedy (D-MA) to pass the Ryan White Comprehensive AIDS Resources Emergency Act—the largest federally-funded program to fight HIV/AIDS and improve treatment for individuals and families suffering from the disease. Despite the hysteria surrounding the epidemic in its early years, Hatch was the first Senator to hold hearings on HIV/AIDS and gained significant attention for his eagerness to hug victims in a time of great misunderstanding and prejudice directed at the disease's victims.

Hatch leads passage of the Radiation Exposure Compensation Act, establishing a landmark federal compensation program for victims of cancer or other diseases as a direct result of their exposure to above-ground nuclear weapons testing. As a result of Hatch's legislation, thousands of "downwinders" from Utah and other western states have been compensated for death and illness suffered as a result of the testing.

Leads Republican support to ensure passage of the Americans with Disabilities Act. This landmark legislation expands opportunities for society's most vulnerable by improving public access for people with disabilities and barring discrimination in jobs, housing, and other key services.

Authors the Child Care and Development Block Grant Act with Senator Chris Dodd (D-CT), providing states with grants to assist low-income families, empower working parents with child care, and offer assistance to parents trying to achieve independence from public welfare. The Act is hailed as a model for empowering states, with the federal government playing a facilitating—rather than an authoritative—role.

1993

Works across the aisle to win passage of the Religious Freedom Restoration Act—a seminal piece of legislation strengthening religious liberty protections for all Americans by prohibiting government policies that substantially burden religious observance. Hatch authored the Act in response to a Supreme Court decision, which allowed neutral laws of general applicability to infringe on the free exercise of religion.

1994

Partners with then-Senator Joe Biden (D-DE) to coauthor the original Violence Against Women Act to improve criminal justice and community-based responses to domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking in the United States.

Authors and leads passage of the Dietary Supplement Health and Education Act, which establishes a balanced regulatory structure to facilitate the availability of safe and affordable dietary supplements.

1996

Recognizing the incalculable damage that methamphetamine can inflict on communities, Hatch sponsors and helps secure passage of the Comprehensive Methamphetamine Control Act, to reduce and prevent the illegal manufacturing and use of methamphetamine.

ORRIN G. HATCH CENTER FOR POLITICAL LEADERSHIP

Senator Orrin Hatch is one of our nation's great leaders and a bastion in Utah politics. His life's work as a public servant has benefited our nation and generations of Utahns. The University of Utah is privileged to propose a means by which to honor his great legacy through the establishment of the Orrin G. Hatch Center for Political Leadership. This proposed center will be housed in a new facility constructed adjacent to the Thomas S. Monson Center in downtown Salt Lake City. This ideal location will offer proximity to important community resources, the University of Utah, and downtown businesses.

This new building would include a replica of the Mr. Hatch's personal senatorial office for his own use, well-appointed offices for the co-directors, space for administrative staff, and meeting rooms. Public-facing areas of the building will be used for curated, museum-quality display of significant documents and artifacts related to the Senator's tenure in office.


With its location on historic South Temple, the Orrin G. Hatch Center for Political Leadership will synergize with leading thought organizations that also line the road from the University of Utah to downtown Salt Lake City. Adjacent to the Kern C. Gardner Policy Institute, the Hatch Center will stand as the premier institution for policy leaders to gather and exchange ideas on political leadership, thought, and strategy. We also anticipate a close relationship between the Center and the Hinckley Institute of Politics. The Hinckley Institute is the preeminent internship placement program in the nation, which also provides unparalleled educational opportunities for all University of Utah students. We foresee countless opportunities for Senator Hatch, and those associated with the Center, to join in the effort of the Hinckley to train the next generation of leaders in our country.

In conjunction with the Orrin G. Hatch Center for Political Leadership, the University respectfully proposes the naming of the new College of Law Building as the Orrin G. Hatch Law Building, which will house researchers working with the Senator's papers as well as the associated archivist and librarian. In collaboration with the Hatch Center, the S.J. Quinney College of Law will provide an excellent venue for preserving the legislative legacy of Senator Hatch through scholarly legal research and educational opportunities for both students of the college as well as the community at large.

Specifically, in addition to the aforementioned constituents of the University's proposal, summarized below are key components of the suggested plan:

- A new building at our South Temple site to house the Orrin G. Hatch Center for Political Leadership, which would report directly to the University President
- A generous annual salary for Senator Hatch to be paid by the University
- A driver and an intern provided for Senator Hatch
- Three co-directors for the Orrin G. Hatch Center for Political Leadership
- Operating and maintenance costs for the new facility
- Senator Hatch's memoirs to be published by the University Press



Introduction: The Orrin G. Hatch Foundation

The Orrin G. Hatch Foundation was established to honor the Senator's legacy and promote thoughtful political engagement through a center for public policy and legislative studies. The Foundation is in discussions with the University of Utah to affiliate the Center with the University.

The University is the State University and the major research university in Utah. Through affiliation with the Center, the University will be able to make the Senator's papers available to the general public, scholars, professors, and students for research for educational and historical purposes.

The Foundation is in control of the papers Senator Hatch has accumulated throughout his service in the United States Senate. The Foundation seeks not only to honor the legacy of Senator Hatch for his years of service to Utah and to the country, but to inspire the community, to promote understanding of government, to encourage civic engagement and public service, and to recruit and to train the next generation of citizens and leaders to engage in the civic life of their communities. The Foundation will raise the funds to endow the Center, its staff, building, library, and programs. The Board of the Foundation is made up of:

The Orrin G. Hatch Center for Political Leadership and Policy

The Hatch Center will serve five primary functions. First it will be the library and archive for Senator Hatch's official Senate papers and records, along with the Senator's personal effects spanning his nearly 40 years in the U.S. Senate. Second, it will be an institute for public policy and civic engagement hosting guest speakers, discussions and panels, debates, and other public events. Third, it will be a place of civic engagement for scholars, public servants, students, and for the broader community. Fourth, it will provide educational programs to immerse students and the public in the legislative process, and provide lectures, dialogues, and presentations that reflect the diversity of viewpoints on how to improve our government and our society. Lastly, it will work with Senator Hatch to publish his memoirs of his experience in Washington D.C., his views on the Constitution, and his experience involvement in the legislative process.

The Hatch Center will be governed by board made up of ____ individuals, including the President of the University of Utah. While the Foundation will be solely responsible for raising all funds necessary to construct the Hatch Center building, and to endow the staff, operate the Center, and fund research
