### DATA HIGHLIGHTS




#### 47% of Utah 4 yo are in ECE Programs

- 51,000 4 year olds in Utah
- Average salary for teacher w/Bachelor's \$25,000 compared to \$46,300 for kindergarten teacher
- 650 schools offer pre-k but data is only reported by 54% of the schools
- 12,128 children age 4 participated in public pre-k or only 25% of incoming kindergarten students
- KEEP Entry Scores—ALL STUDENTS: 58% proficient in Literacy; 71% proficient in Numeracy
- KEEP Entry—LOW-INCOME: 35% in Literacy; 52% in Numeracy

- Definition of High Quality School Readiness
- Utah first in nation to establish Pay for Success Transaction
- Initial investment in high quality preschool
- Establishment of the School Readiness Board
- Scholarships for children experiencing Intergenerational Poverty
- 2016 invested to expand seats for low-income 4 yo
- Funding for 300 early childhood educators to obtain CDA
- UPSTART home-based technology
- OCC Preschool Quality Improvement Grants
- Head Start Programs Serving Approximately 6,000 children

- 3. Quality teaching, as discussed by USBE
- 4. Early childhood coordination and alignment to address the whole child's development
  - 1. Developmental screenings
  - 2. Supporting parents as child's first teacher through early literacy
  - 3. Health needs address—behavioral and physical
