CURRENT FACILITY ISSUES

Utah Highway Patrol/Fire Marshal

- Section 1 (Brigham city) concerns with functionality of space, security and future lease.
- Section 1 (Logan) this facility closed July 2016. The Logan Driver License office provides an office for a Trooper to use.

911 Communications

- Console space is already maxed out at four.
- · Immediate need for two more consoles.
- Currently located in the Box Elder Sheriff's Office and has need to reprogram space.

Driver License

- Driver License is unable to expand in their current building
- BATC and USU Brigham City campus would like to use the space occupied by Drive License to expand their program.
- Inability to accommodate the escalating demand for Driver License services.

AGENCY NEEDS

- 1. UHP & Fire Marshal
- 10,000 square feet
- Office space for Cache and Box Elder County troopers, evidence storage space and a secured controlled entry or sally port.

2. 911 Communications

- 3,000 square feet
- Six consoles with expansion to eight
- 3. Driver License Division
- 4,500 square feet
- Outside paved area for commercial and motorcycle testing (120 ft x 240 ft)

LONG TERM CONSIDERATIONS

1.Population Growth

- The new building would reduce strain on each division with the continued population growth, which is expected to grow 30% by 2030.
- 2. Increased Need for Services
- 10%-30% immediate and future growth to meet public safety demands. This includes law enforcement, investigation services, immediate need for six 911 communication consoles with expansion to eight consoles and DLD testing services.
- 3. Current Locations
- Divisions are occupying temporary and inadequate space that will be reassigned by building owners.

FUNDS

Soft Costs: \$2,288,564 (\$131.91 cost/sq.ft.

Construction Costs: \$7,287,114 (\$420.01 cost/sq.ft.) Total Cost of Project: \$9,575,678 (\$551.91 cost/sq.ft.)

DFCM currently has \$2,050,000 remaining appropriations for this project.

Legislative Request: \$7,525,678

PROIECT SUMMARY

- Working with DFCM, we have identified 12 acres owned by DFCM located in Brigham City.
- Critical functions could be housed in one DFCM owned building instead of four separate facilities owned by private citizens or county government.
- Accommodate the needed expansion within each agency.
- Reduce strain on each agency with the continued population growth. The population is estimated to grow 50% in the next 35 years.
