7. Municipal Water Resources

The commission will discuss proposed constitutional amendment D that specifies the circumstances under which a municipality may commit water resources or supply water outside its boundary or exchange water resources and revise provisions surrounding municipal water rights. If constitutional amendment D is approved by voters, H.B. 31, Water Supply and Surplus Water Amendments, 2019 General Session, will also take effect and become law. H.B. 31 addresses municipalities that provide water services to consumers outside of their area of jurisdiction.
