ISSUE BRIEF

#### **SUMMARY**

Utah Code Annotated (UCA) 63J-5-201 states, "the Legislative Fiscal Analyst shall submit a federal funds request summary for each agency to the legislative appropriations subcommittee responsible for that agency's budget for review during each annual general session." Each subcommittee determines whether to recommend that "the agency accept the federal funds or participate in the federal program for the fiscal year under consideration." The Executive Appropriations Committee then makes their determination and directs the Office of the Legislative Fiscal Analyst to include approved federal funds in an appropriations act.

The Department of Workforce Services (DWS) has requested an increase in federal funds of \$59,113,400 for FY 2021. DWS further requests total federal funds of \$864,587,000 for FY 2022, with total state match of \$24,097,400. This means the agency would receive, on average, \$36 federal dollars for every \$1 spent in state match. The estimate of these federal funds is subject to any subsequent actions taken by the Legislature with regard to reductions in state appropriations.

#### **LEGISLATIVE ACTION**

1. The Office of the Legislative Fiscal Analyst recommends the subcommittee consider whether to authorize the Department of Workforce Services to accept the federal funds shown in Table 2 (page 2) and Appendix A (pages 5-14).

#### Subcommittee Options for Federal Grants

Per UCA 63J-5-201, the subcommittee has the following three options:

- 1. Recommend that the agency accept the federal funds or participate in the federal program for the fiscal year under consideration.
- 2. Recommend that the agency <u>not</u> accept the federal funds or participate in the federal program for the fiscal year under consideration.
- 3. Direct the agency to accept some, but not all, of the federal funds listed below.

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#### FY 2021 SUPPLEMENTAL REQUEST OVERVIEW

The department is requesting increased federal grant authorization of \$59,113,400 for FY 2021 in addition to the \$629,220,100 appropriated during the 2020 General Session and the \$2,315,921,700 appropriated during multiple Special Sessions. That is a 2% increase. The amount is comprised of requested increases in the programs shown in Table 1.

With this increase, total federal funds would be approximately 84.3 percent of the DWS FY 2021 budget.

#### FY 2022 REQUEST OVERVIEW

The department is requesting federal grant authorization totaling \$864,587,000 for FY 2022 as shown in Table 3. This amount is \$235,366,900 more than the \$629,220,100 that was appropriated during the 2020 General Session for FY 2021, an increase of 37.4 percent in federal funds. The requested increase in federal funds authority for FY 2022 is primarily comprised of an increase in federal funds spending authority for Nutritional Assistance.

Details for each line item are shown in Appendix A.

Total federal funds would be 55.7 percent of the DWS FY 2022 budget.

#### STATE OFFICE OF REHABILITATION

The request for FY 2022 is a 0.2 percent increase from the amount initially appropriated for FY 2021. There is one new grant that was not previously authorized by the Legislature during the 2020 General Session or Special Sessions, the Unemployment Insurance; Utah UI Training Center grant that is to support the development and hosting of UI program training for 53 state workforce agencies.

#### **ADMINISTRATION**

The request for FY 2022 is a 0.5 percent increase from the amount initially appropriated for FY 2021. There is one new grant that was not previously authorized by the Legislature during the 2020 General Session or the Special Sessions, the Unemployment Insurance; Utah UI Training Center grant that is to support the development and hosting of UI program training for 53 state workforce agencies.

#### **OPERATIONS & POLICY**

The request for FY 2022 is a 14.4 percent increase from the amount initially appropriated for FY 2021. There are two new grants that were not previously authorized by the Legislature during the 2020 General Session or the Special Sessions, the Unemployment Insurance; Utah UI Training Center grant that is to support the development and hosting of UI program training for 53 state workforce agencies and the Supplemental Nutritional Assistance Electronic Benefits Transfer Project which assists farmers markets to purchase and maintain equipment needed to accept SNAP EBT cards.

#### **NUTRITIONAL ASSISTANCE**

The request for FY 2022 is a 66.5 percent increase from the amount initially appropriated for FY 2021. There are no new grants that were not previously authorized by the Legislature during the 2020 General Session.

#### **HOUSING & COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT**

The request for FY 2022 is a 73.0 percent increase over the amount initially appropriated for FY 2021. There are no new grants that were not previously authorized by the Legislature during the 2020 General Session or the Special Sessions, only expanded grants for pandemic response activities related to the Community Development Block Grant, Emergency Solutions Grant, Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS, and Community Services Block Grant.

#### UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE

The request for FY 2022 is a 35.4 percent increase over the amount initially appropriated for FY 2021. There is one new grant that was not previously authorized by the Legislature during the 2020 General Session or the Special Sessions, the Unemployment Insurance; Utah UI Training Center grant that is to support the development and hosting of UI program training for 53 state workforce agencies.

#### UNEMPLOYMENT COMPENSATION FUND

The request for FY 2022 is the same as the amount initially appropriated for FY 2021. There are no new grants that were not previously authorized by the Legislature during the 2020 General Session.

#### **OLENE WALKER HOUSING LOAN FUND (Funds 5426 and 5452)**

The request for FY 2022 is a 12.5 percent increase from the amount initially appropriated for FY 2021. There are no new grants that were not previously authorized by the Legislature during the 2020 General Session.

#### APPENDIX D: INTERIM APPROVAL PROCESS FOR FEDERAL GRANTS

Per UCA 63J-5-204, if agencies receive grants after the General Session approval process, these grants may be approved according to the following criteria:

#### Grants Subject to Approval by the Governor, the Judicial Council, or the State Board of Education

- 1. Less than \$1 million;
- 2. Add no permanent employees; or
- 3. Require a state match less than \$1 million.

#### Grants Subject to Approval by the Executive Appropriations Committee

- 4. More than \$1 million but less than \$10 million;
- 5. Add 1 to 10 permanent employees; or
- 6. Require a state match up to \$1 million.

#### Grants Subject to Approval by the full Legislature

- 1. More than \$10 million;
- 2. Add 11 or more permanent employees; or
- 3. Require a state match greater than \$1 million.
