Utah Children's Health Insurance Facts

- An estimated 82,000 Utah children were uninsured last year—a 39% increase from 2016.
- We rank 46th out of 50 states in the highest number of uninsured kids.
- Utah has the highest rate of uninsured Latino or Hispanic children in the nation.

Why Health Insurance Matters for Utah Kids and Families

- Better Short-and-Long-Term Outcomes for Kids: Research shows that when children
 have uninterrupted access to health care, they perform better in school, are more
 likely to participate in the workforce as adults, and less likely to have high-cost
 chronic conditions that go untreated. Making sure all Utah kids have health
 insurance pays off in the long run.
- Research shows that children's health insurance improves economic security for families, creating fewer financial stressors and greater overall family stability and mobility.
- When one child is uninsured, it impacts the well-being of the entire family, making it harder for children to access consistent, affordable coverage.

What Does S.B. 158 do?

- Creates a comprehensive outreach program to address social determinants of health to increase insurance enrollment of eligible children.
- Covers all children under 200% of the federal poverty level.
