Mission of Utah Department of Corrections

Our dedicated team of professionals <u>ensures public safety</u> by effectively managing offenders while maintaining close <u>collaboration with partner agencies</u> and the community. Our team is devoted to providing maximum <u>opportunities for offenders to make lasting changes</u> through accountability, treatment, education, and positive reinforcement within a safe environment.

Key statutory duties outlined in UCA § 64-13-6

- Protect the public
- Provide evidence-based and evidence-informed program opportunities
- Supervise probationers and parolees
- Collaborate with other state, local, and federal law enforcement agencies
- Establish a case action plan



Challenges in Community Supervision

- Complex social issues with multiple agencies involved
- Assessed risk levels for those on AP&P supervision has been increasing
 - More higher risk individuals on supervision and fewer low risk individuals
 - Higher risk individuals require more case planning, interventions and are more likely to violate terms of supervision (e.g. absconding)
- Agent workload intensity is increasing, even as total caseload declines
 - Risk adjusted caseload



Challenges in Community Supervision




- Individuals on probation or parole continue to have underlying issues, including antisocial characteristics / substance use disorders
- Absconding is potential factor whenever people are placed on supervision
- People on probation or parole enter an agreement with terms and conditions
- Temporary impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic to supervision



AP&P Response to Absconding



- POST certification AP&P agents are law enforcement officers
 - o 347 agents & senior agents (*July 2021*), 143 correctional officers, 58 supervisors
 - Also trained in evidence-based practices for community corrections
- Resource increases from 2015 to 2021 additional 54 AP&P agents
- Collaboration with stakeholders, data sharing & evaluation





AP&P Response to Absconding



- Fugitive response teams all five regions of the state
- Special functions unit list warrants and extradite parole fugitives
- Task force operations agents assigned to local, state and federal multijurisdictional teams
- Partnership with US Marshals (VFAST) 23 part-time and one full-time





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
