

Charter Schools

Public schools, public funding

Operate under a charter contract


May be exempt from some rules/regulations

Charter authorizers

Function as their own LEA

More flexibility, more oversight





State charter school board

- Authorizes the majority of Utah's charter schools
- Approve/reject charter applications
- Charter school monitoring
- Revoke charter contracts






Charter school governing boards

- School oversight
- Adopt annual budget
- Charter school contract specifies board composition and selection
- Comply with LEA governing board requirements





Most Public Education Funding is Based on:

Enrollment Generation of WPUs Weightings Revenue for Value of the WPU \$ each WPU

(Number of WPUs) X (Value of Weighted Pupil Unit) = Amount of funding for public education Basic School Program

2020 Constitutional Amendment:

- Voters approved amendment that expanded use of income tax to include programs that support children and persons with disabilities (Article XIII, Section 5)
- Legislature adopted statutory framework that provides stabilization of education funding (HB 357, 2020 General Session)
 - Enrollment growth and inflation in public education base budget
 - Creation of "working rainy day fund"

2021 Students At-risk Add-on:

• SB 142: created WPU add-on for students at higher risk of academic failure. Provides additional funding for students who are economically disadvantaged and/or English language learners.



Fiscal Year 2023 Base Budget

What did these changes mean for this year's base education budget?

\$263 million additional on-going and \$19 million one-time for FY2023

Includes additional funding for

- Enrollment Growth
- Inflation Adjustment on WPU value
- Increasing At-Risk Weighting
- Economic Stabilization Account Deposits



Utah's School Accountability System

The state board annually publishes report cards for schools and districts with information about their students' performance in multiple areas, including performance and growth on statewide assessments.

The state board identifies the lowest performing schools, which are subject to interventions.

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Five indicators used to measure student progress:

- Performance on state tests
- Growth on state tests
 - All students
 - Lowest-performing 25% of students
- English-language proficiency
- High school graduation rates
- Postsecondary readiness
 - ACT in grade 11
 - Student achievement in advanced coursework


Utah State Board of Education issues yearly report cards for districts and schools, including:

- School performance on each of the five indicators
- Percent student assessment participation
- A-F letter grade, calculated based on school performance on the five indicators
 - The legislature exempted this requirement in 2020 and 2021; the state board has yet to issue school letter grades.
- Other grade-specific information
- Optional: 1-2 other self-reported school quality indicators







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State Board of Education Seeks Public Feedback on School Accountability Redesign

SALT LAKE CITY – The Utah State Board of Education (USBE) and the Utah State Legislature are partnering to reexamine the state's school accountability system. The current Utah School
Accountability System was established through Senate Bill 220 during the 2017 legislative session, prior to the advancement of the Personalized, Competency-Based Learning and Portrait of a Graduate
initiatives. The pandemic has highlighted the dependency of the school accountability system on access to state assessment results. The state is seeking to build a new accountability system to be:

- Inclusive of the additional initiatives
- More comprehensive in evaluation criteria
- Aligned with and supportive of continuous school improvement efforts for all schools

For this work to be successful, the state needs to hear from the public on the information needed to better understand school quality. USBE is asking interested members of the public to take a 10-minute, online survey to provide input on the future of school accountability in Utah. The survey will be open until February 18, 2022. USBE will offer both virtual and in-person opportunities to engage further along in the process.
