Peace Officer Training Amendment

Rep. Kwon presented the bill with the assistance of Major Scott Stephenson, Peace Officer Standards and Training Director. A handout was provided.

Nate Mutter, Law Enforcement Legislative Committee Co-chair, spoke in support of the bill.

1. Page 1, Lines 8 through 10:

8 General Description:

- 9 This bill requires a portion of a peace officer's { annual } basic training to include certain

61 <u>instruction on identifying, responding to, and reporting a criminal offense that is:</u>

- 62 (a) motivated by a personal attribute, as that term is defined in Section 76-3-203.14,
- 63 victim targeting penalty enhancement; or
- 64 (b) in violation of a federal criminal law concerning hate crimes.
