### Universities Are Subject to Unique Public Safety Regulations

- The Clery Act
  - Federal law
  - Obligations include:
    - Continuous threat assessments and campus warnings when appropriate
    - Statistical tracking/reporting for certain crimes
    - Annual Security Report (ASR)





- Title IX of the 1972 Education Amendments
  - Title IX obligations can overlap with Clery Act obligations
  - Title IX investigations are administrative, not criminal
- State laws also create unique campus safety obligations
  - Universities must share certain crime information with off-campus police
  - State laws require unique reporting beyond the Clery Act







## Improving Clery Act Threat Assessment and Reporting Could Enhance Safety and Reduce Liability

- We found instances in which U of U entities did not adequately communicate campus safety information to university police
  - U of U Housing staff did not make timely reports of alleged crimes
- The U of U hospital system is not reporting all crime statistics as required under the Clery Act





### USHE Institutions Should Assess Public Safety Needs and Service Options

#### Level of Service and Operational Control Drive Costs



- Institutions of higher education would likely pay more for police service through contracts
  - Contracts make sense in the right circumstances
  - Any reduction in cost would likely come from a reduction in service
- We recommend that each institution assess its public safety needs and service options
  - Institutions are different and face different circumstances





- First, conduct an inventory of current services and demand
- Second, review crime and calls for service
- Third, assess the impact of future growth
- Fourth, review labor, equipment, training, and other costs relative to surrounding law enforcement agencies.
