

## Legislative Interim Meetings

Meetings were held May, 18, 2022, or as noted

### **Business and Labor**

#### 2022 Interim Study Items

Reviewed proposed interim <u>study items</u> for the 2022 Business and Labor Interim Committee. The committee chairs, with input from legislators, executive branch agencies, and the Legislative Management Committee, prepared a list of 18 potential items that the committee could study during this interim period.

**Actions:** Voted to modify the proposed interim study item list by adding the study of fraudulent ticket sales in the state.

Voted to approve the proposed interim study items as modified.

Voted to grant the chairs authority to open committee bill files for items on the study list.

#### **Sunset Review - Board of Credit Union Advisors**

Received a summary of the committee's <u>2022 Sunset</u> Review Assignments from committee staff and an explanation of the statutory guidelines for conducting a sunset review.

Absent further action by the Legislature, Utah Code <u>Section 7-9-43</u>, which creates the Board of Credit Union Advisors, will be repealed July 1, 2023. The committee conducted a sunset review of the statute and determined it should be reauthorized.

Received presentations from the Department of Financial Institutions, Board of Credit Union Advisors, and the Utah Credit Union Association.

#### **Collection Agencies**

Received a <u>presentation</u> from the Division of Corporations and Commercial Code regarding <u>Title 12</u>, <u>Collection</u> <u>Agencies</u>.

Discussed whether Title 12 and the registration and bonding requirements are still serving their intended purposes or if the title needs updating.

Discussed and determined that Title 12 should be repealed, except for Utah Code Section 12-1-11, Collection fee -- Convenience fees.

#### **Copay Accumulator**

Action: Voted to open a committee bill file related to copay accumulators, which will address how insurance plans count coupons and rebates for an individual's deductible and out of pocket maximum limits and provide additional transparency regarding pharmacy benefit managers.

## Sunset Review - Duties and Powers of the Insurance Commissioner

Received a presentation from the insurance commissioner pertaining to Utah Code <u>Section 31A-2-217</u>, Coordination with other states, which relates to the duties and powers of the insurance commissioner. Absent further action by the Legislature, this provision will be repealed July 1, 2023. The committee conducted a sunset review of the statute and determine it should be reauthorized.

## **Sunset Review - Hearing Instrument Specialist Licensing Act**

Received a presentation from committee staff pertaining to Utah Code, <u>Title 58</u>, <u>Chapter 46a</u>, <u>Hearing Instrument Specialist Licensing Act</u>, which will be repealed July 1, 2023, absent further action by the Legislature. The committee conducted a sunset review of the statute and determined it should be reauthorized.

#### Heard from the:

- International Hearing Society and National Board for Certification in Hearing Instrument Sciences;
- · Hearing Healthcare Providers of Utah; and
- Miracle Ear.

#### **Medical Cannabis Businesses**

Studied how the medical cannabis and financial services industries interact and policies that prevent the two industries from working together.

Discussed the risk to financial institutions that service the medical cannabis industry and the need for Congress to pass the SAFE Banking Act.

Heard from the Utah Cannabis Association, Utah Cannabis Co-Op, Utah Patients Coalition, Department of Financial Institutions, Utah Bankers Association, and Utah Credit Union Association.

#### 2022 Study Items and Reports

**Actions:** Voted to amend the interim study items list by replacing the Hope Scholarship item with an item to study parent involvement in student learning options.

Voted to approve the amended interim study item list.

Voted to allow the committee chairs to open committee bill files on topics related to the approved interim study item list.

## Higher Education - Aligning Technical Education Credit Hours

Heard a <u>presentation</u> on how leaders in the higher education system have been working to better align credit hours in technical colleges and degree-granting institutions to make it easier for students to transfer between institutions.

## Legislative Audit - Higher Education Police Departments

Heard a <u>report</u> from Office of the Legislative Auditor General staff on audit report #2022-01, <u>A Performance Audit of Higher Education Police Departments</u>. The Legislative Audit Subcommittee assigned this report to the committee on April 20, 2022.

## Legislative Audit - Public Education Teacher Retention

Heard a <u>report</u> from Office of the Legislative Auditor General staff on audit report #2021-13, <u>A Performance Audit of Teacher Retention Within Utah's Public Education System</u>. The State Board of Education provided a <u>response</u> to the audit. The Legislative Audit Subcommittee assigned this report to the committee on December 7, 2021.

## Education and Mental Health Coordinating Council

May 11, 2022

#### **Behavioral Health in Schools**

Received a presentation from school behavioral health professionals about mental health services and experiences in schools.

#### **Council Priority Items Discussion**

Discussed potential council priority items for further investigation.

**Action:** Voted to prioritize three topics for further council investigation:

- Early childhood mental health public awareness and education campaign;
- Evidence-based approaches to youth suicide surveillance and prevention; and
- Investigation of Medicaid reimbursement relating to integration of physical and behavioral health, with specificity to early and periodic screening, diagnostic, and treatment.

## Utah Early Childhood Mental Health Working Group Update

Received a <u>presentation</u> from the Utah Early Childhood Mental Health Working Group on proposed strategies and tactics to improve early childhood mental health.

## **Government Operations**

#### **Committee Study Items**

Reviewed the approved interim study item assignments from the Legislative Management Committee.

Actions: Voted to amend and approve the interim <u>study</u> <u>item list</u> to include environmental, social governance (ESG) factors in credit ratings and an examination of the School and Institutional Trust Lands Administration (SITLA) code related to exchanges.

Voted to authorize the committee chairs to independently open one or more committee bill files as needed.

#### **Cure Letter Lists**

Discussed cure letter lists, which are created when there is a discrepancy with a voter's signature. Each county treats these lists differently when determining if the list is considered a record for Government Records Access and Management Act (GRAMA) purposes.

**Action:** Voted to open a committee bill file to address cure letter lists.



#### **Environmental, Social, Governance Factors**

Heard from the Attorney General's Office and the Office of State Treasurer regarding Environmental, Social, and Governance (ESG) factors and how they could affect the state's credit ratings.

#### **Local District Amendments**

Discussed 2022 General Session H.B. 454, "Local District Amendments," which would have replaced the term "local districts" with the term "special districts" throughout the Utah Code.

**Action:** Voted to open a committee bill file to amend the term "local districts."

#### **Signature Verification Requirements**

Received a <u>presentation</u> from the Lieutenant Governor's Office comparing the signature verification requirements for state and local initiative and referenda to the signature verification requirements for other types of petitions such as annexations, incorporations, service districts, and county creations.

**Action:** Voted to open a committee bill file to address the various signature verification requirements for differing types of petitions.

#### Title 71 Recodification

**Action:** Voted to open a committee bill file to recodify Title 71, Veterans, of the Utah Code.

## **Health and Human Services**

#### 2022 Interim Study Plan

Reviewed interim <u>study item assignments</u> from the Legislative Management Committee and discussed further plans for interim study.

Actions: Voted to approve the interim study items list.

Voted to authorize the committee chairs to open committee bill files related to the approved study item list.

#### **Healthcare Reform - Prescription Drugs**

Discussed what the Legislature can do to sustain or enable changes in the production, distribution, prescribing, purchase, and use of prescription drugs that will promote better health outcomes at the lowest possible cost for PEHP, Medicaid, and the commercial health insurance market.

Briefed by the <u>Utah Insurance Department</u>, a <u>local nonprofit</u> drug manufacturer, <u>PEHP</u>, <u>Medicaid</u>, <u>Utah Medical</u>
<u>Association</u>, <u>Pharmaceutical Research and Manufacturers</u> of <u>America</u>, the <u>Utah Department of Health's Office of Health Care Statistics</u>, and a <u>local insurer</u> that also operates a pharmacy benefit management service.

**Action:** Voted to open a committee bill file that would allow PEHP to expand a program that allows any person in the state to purchase insulin and epinephrine auto-injectors at PEHP's post-manufacturer-rebate prices. The bill would authorize PEHP to include other prescription drugs.

#### One Utah Health Collaborative

Received a <u>presentation</u> by the One Utah Health Collaborative, announced last Fall by Governor Cox and funded in part during the 2022 General Session with a one-time General Fund appropriation. A member of the executive committee discussed the collaborative's vision, guiding principles, funding, and organizational timeline.

#### **Sunset Reviews**

Received a <u>presentation</u> from committee staff summarizing the committee's duties surrounding sunset reviews and the various sunset reviews that the committee is responsible for during the interim session.

Voted to add the calls for legislative action in C.R. England v. Hakem, doTERRA International v. Kruger, and Diderickson and Bruun v. State to the committee's approved interim study items list.

#### **Committee Business**

Received an overview from committee staff on items available under meeting materials, including the list of required <u>agency reports</u> due to the committee in 2022.

#### **Justice Court Reform**

Received a <u>presentation</u> from the Task Force on Justice Court Reform on the court's proposal to create a new division of the district courts to handle all misdemeanor and small claims cases.

Voted to open a committee bill file to address license plate issues, including repealing the <u>Honorary Consul special group plate</u> and recodifying the current license plate dedicated credit fund as recommended by the <u>2018 In-Depth Budget Review of the State Tax Commission</u>.

#### **Road Debris**

Received a <u>presentation</u> from the Utah Department of Transportation (UDOT) on litter on roadways, costs of managing the litter control program, and corporate and community programs to keep roads clean.

Received a <u>presentation</u> from the Utah Highway Patrol on roadway debris enforcement and strategies to target unsecured loads including increased public outreach, focused enforcement efforts, commercial motor vehicle enforcement, and load origination engagement and enforcement.

#### **Roadway Safety**

Received a joint presentation from UDOT and the Utah Highway Patrol on a proposal for infrastructure and personnel resources to patrol and enforce traffic safety along the Bangerter Highway and Mountain View Corridor.
