# State Rail Safety Participation Program

#### **Summary**

States are authorized to work in partnership with the Federal Railroad Administration to enforce federal railroad safety laws and regulations through the <u>State Rail Safety Participation Program</u>. The primary goal of this program is for participating states to maintain the proper certifications necessary to perform investigative and surveillance activities to enforce federal requirements.

Most states (29 and D.C.) participate in the program either through their Departments of Transportation or a regulatory agency, such as public utilities or public service commissions, and receive funding under the related <u>grant program</u>.

#### **Federal Authority and Regulation**

The Federal Railroad Administration's (FRA) Office of Railroad Safety regulates safety throughout the Nation's railroad industry. States are authorized through <u>49 U.S.C. § 20105</u> to work in partnership with FRA to enforce federal railroad safety laws and regulations. To participate, states must enter into an agreement with FRA through the <u>State Rail Safety</u> <u>Participation Program</u> for the exercise of specified authority regarding all or any part of Federal railroad safety laws. This program is regulated through <u>49 CFR 212</u>.

A state agency with jurisdiction under state law may participate in investigative and surveillance activities in one of two ways:

- 1) By entering into an agreement with the FRA under <u>49 CFR § 212.105</u>
  - This is the principal method by which States may participate in investigative and surveillance activities. An agreement may delegate investigative and surveillance authority with respect to all or any part of the Federal railroad safety laws.
- 2) By filing an annual certification under <u>49 CFR § 212.107</u>.
  - This option is available in the event the FRA and the state agency do not agree on the terms for participation under <u>49 CFR § 212.105</u>.

#### **State Participation**

As of June 2022, at least <u>30 states and the District of Columbia</u> were participating in the State Rail Safety Program—either through state Departments of Transportation or through state regulatory agencies, such as public utilities or public service commissions. States with an agreement with the FRA are eligible to apply for the related <u>grant program</u>, initiated in FY2017, that supports technical training, travel expenses, and computers required to support reporting and data analysis.



A few examples of state programs are highlighted in <u>Appendix B</u> and a complete list of participating states is included in <u>Appendix</u> <u>C</u>, below.

In general, state programs may



perform investigative, surveillance, and enforcement activities in one of six main disciplines: track, motive power and equipment, operating practices, hazardous materials, grade crossing, and signal and train control.

#### **Budgets and Funding**

The table below contains information on how eight states who have FRA safety programs fund their offices. Funding comes from either a general fund appropriation or fees collected from the rail companies operating in the state. Information was gathered from phone calls with the state office rail managers or through a search of state code.
