2122	Be it enacted by the Legislature of the state of Utah:
23	Section 1. Section 63M-11-203 is amended to read:
24	63M-11-203. Duties and powers of commission.
25	(1) The commission shall:
26	(a) fulfill the commission's purposes described in Section 63M-11-102;
27	(b) facilitate the communication and coordination of public and private entities that
28	provide services to the aging population, including entities responsible for services related to:
29	(i) housing;
30	(ii) transportation;
31	(iii) caregiver support;
32	(iv) preventive health services;

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33	(v) individuals with physical or developmental disabilities;
34	(vi) dementia and Alzheimer's disease; and
35	(vii) facility licensing;
36	(c) study, evaluate, and report on the status and effectiveness of policies, procedures,
37	and programs that provide services to the aging population;
38	(d) study and evaluate the policies, procedures, and programs implemented by other
39	states that address the needs of the aging population;
40	(e) facilitate and conduct the research and study of issues related to aging, including
41	emerging public health issues with a significant impact on the aging population;
42	(f) provide a forum for public comment on issues related to aging;
43	(g) provide public information on the aging population and the services available to the
44	aging population;
45	(h) facilitate the provision of services to the aging population from the public and
46	private sectors; and
47	(i) encourage state and local governments to analyze, plan, and prepare for the impacts
48	of the aging population on services and operations.
49	(2) To accomplish the commission's duties, the commission may:
50	(a) request and receive from any state or local governmental agency or institution,
51	summary information relating to the aging population, including:
52	(i) reports;
53	(ii) audits;
54	(iii) projections; and
55	(iv) statistics;
56	(b) apply for and accept grants or donations for uses consistent with the duties of the
57	commission from public or private sources; and
58	(c) appoint special committees to advise and assist the commission.
59	(3) All funds received under Subsection (2)(b) shall be:
60	(a) accounted for and expended in compliance with the requirements of federal and
61	state law; and
62	(b) continuously available to the commission to carry out the commission's duties.
63	(4) (a) A member of a special committee described in Subsection (2)(c):

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64	(i) shall be appointed by the commission;
65	(ii) may be:
66	(A) a member of the commission; or
67	(B) an individual from the private or public sector; and
68	(iii) notwithstanding Section 63M-11-206, shall not receive any reimbursement or pay
69	for any work done in relation to the special committee.
70	(b) A special committee described in Subsection (2)(c) shall report to the commission
71	on the progress of the special committee.
72	(5) This chapter does not diminish the planning authority conferred on state, regional,
73	and local governments by existing law.

76	(1) (a) The commission shall annually prepare and publish a report directed to the:
77	[(a)] (i) governor; and
78	[(b)] (ii) Health and Human Services Interim Committee.
79	$[\frac{(2)}{(b)}]$ The report described in Subsection $(1)(\underline{a})$ shall:
80	$\left[\frac{a}{a}\right]$ (i) describe how the commission fulfilled its statutory purposes and duties during
81	the year; and
82	[(b)] (ii) contain recommendations on how the state should act to address issues
83	relating to the aging population.
84	(2) (a) The commission shall:
85	(i) prepare and publish a 10-year master plan with recommendations for services
86	affecting the aging population; and
87	(ii) no later than November 1 of 2023, submit the master plan and the commission's
88	work plan described in Subsection (2)(b) in writing to:
89	(A) the governor; and
90	(B) the Health and Human Services Interim Committee.
91	(b) For the master plan, the commission shall:
92	(i) identify and prioritize the commission's goals, objectives, performance measures,
93	and strategies, whether existing or needed, to address demographic factors contributing to the
94	needs of the state's aging population;

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95	(ii) adopt a plan for the commission's work over the next three years to address
96	priorities described in Subsection (2)(b)(i); and
97	(iii) identify redundancies in aging services across the state, including working groups
98	or task forces, and local and state executive branch services, and make recommendations for
99	consolidation.
100	(c) The plan adopted under Subsection (2)(b)(ii) shall:
101	(i) describe which state, local, and private groups the commission has or intends to
102	engage; and
103	(ii) specify any additional funding the commission determines the commission will
104	require to accomplish the commission's duties under this Subsection (2), including any funds to
105	contract for services to assist the commission in the commission's duties.
106	(3) Before July 1, 2026, the commission shall report to the Health and Human Services
107	Interim Committee on:
108	(a) proposals for the future review of and updates to the master plan; and
109	(b) any proposed legislation concerning the master plan or the recommendations made
110	in the master plan.
