

HB 26: License Plate Amendments

Significant Policy Changes

- 1. Creates "License Plate Restricted Account" within the General Fund
 - Legislature appropriates these funds to cover the cost of issuing license plates and decals
 - Many cause-specific restricted accounts for special group plates are repealed

2. Standard License Plates

- DMV may offer up to 4 standard designs at one time
 - a. 2 representing state's economy or geography
 - b. 1 representing state's values or culture
 - c. 1 commemorating a current event relevant to the state or an anniversary of an event
- Each design for at least a 10-year period (the event plate for no more than 5)
- No more than 4 designs at a time
- New process for design approval before DMV can issue, the Governor shall:
 - a. Consult with Department of Cultural and Community Engagement
 - b. Identify which design will be replaced
 - c. Submit design to Transportation Interim Committee for approval
 - d. DMV can issue if:
 - Legislature issues Concurrent Resolution to approve design; and
 - Sufficient funds are appropriated for cost of production
- DMV cannot order or produce a discontinued license plate, except to exhaust remaining stock
- Registration decals unless rule states otherwise:
 - a. Month decal displayed on left
 - Year decal displayed on right
- DMV has rulemaking authority on placement and positioning of registration decals on license plates

3. Personalized Plates

- Creates a moratorium on personalized plates from July 1, 2023 to July 1, 2025
- Transportation Interim Committee will study personalized license plate programs in other states, including court cases, rulings, responses to legal challenges, and recommendations on or before Oct. 1 each year
 - Recommendations could include reinstating the program, continuing the moratorium, modifying or repealing the program
