Our Why:

Fewer than 20% of Weber County students receiving free/reduced lunch are proficient in core academic subjects.

In Utah, juvenile crime peaks from 2 to 6 pm on school days, with about 25 percent of all juvenile crime occurring during the hours following the last school bell.

22% of Utah's teens are at risk of remaining in poverty as they become adults.

Youth who experience long periods of poverty in the early teenage years (ages 11-15) are more likely to engage in both property and violent offending.

Neasurable Outcomes:

97% of our youth state adults at the club care about them.

89% of our members believe they can make a difference in their community.

72% of our youth and teens are physically active for at least 60 minutes two or more days per week.

92% of our youth problem-solve when something important in their lives goes wrong.

47% of our front-line staff are minority.

95%

of our youth report that there is an adult on staff who believes they will be successful. 84%

of our youth and teens expect to complete some kind of post-secondary education

Goals:

The Teen Center will provide out-of-school-time opportunities for over 300 Weber County teens ages 12-18 annually. Club participation:

increases graduation rates
builds healthy and supportive relationships
prepares teens for college and careers
increases civic engagement
builds self-esteem and confidence

Data reveals early intervention in academics and mentoring reduces juvenile Justice incidents and eventual adult incarceration and recidivism.
