Overview of Recodification Project: Purpose

Standardize existing offenses into a set framework, to allow for:

- Automation for law enforcement and prosecutorial offices
- Easier data collection
- Clarity in the law

Clarify and standardize language

Break apart statutes with multiple offenses into single statutes

Technical changes only



Overview: New Structure

Standardized structure for offenses:

- (1): Definitions related to section
- (2): Elements of offense
- (3): Penalties
- (4): Limitations/Defenses
- (5) (6, etc.): Additional information related to punishment and other subjects

*First three subsections are rigidly enforced; the remaining subsections may be altered due to drafting concerns.



Example:

Section 76-8-316. Influencing, impeding, or retaliating against a judge or member of the Board of Pardons and Parole or acting against a family member of a judge or a member of the Board of Pardons and Parole.

version
contains four
different
offenses:

- Threats (Subsection (2))
- Assault (Subsection (3))
- Aggravated assault (Subsection (4))
- Attempted murder (Subsection (5))



Now broken into four new offense sections:

- •Section 76-8-316. Threat
- •Section 76-8-316.2 Assault
- Section 76-8-316.4 Aggravated assault
- Section 76-8-316.6 Attempted murder
