



GALLUP Confidence in institutions 2015 - 2023



GALLUP % of Americans who have "a great deal" or "quite a lot" of confidence in **higher education**, change from 2015 to 2023.















5 Year Resident Tuition, Fees, and Net Price at the University of Utah

Service Scholarship.

Goal 1: Support a generation of service-minded leaders, problem-solvers, and bridge-builders.

Goal 2: Help college students graduate on time and with less debt.

Goal 3: Address societal challenges through service-learning experiences.

Challenges: College students need experience, scholarships, and living support.

Student Benefits: \$3,000 scholarship + \$2,000 wages/living allowance = \$5,000 PER SEMESTER







Enrollment History: HEADCOUNT



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Enrollment History: FTE



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
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Statewide Attainment Goal: ACCESS


Statewide Attainment Goal: COMPLETION

Job Placement

- The U's graduates have a median income of \$64,000, the highest among USHE schools and within the 67th percentile in the US.¹
- The U's non-resident graduates remaining in Utah one-year later has increased over the last 6 years from 42% among 2016 graduates to 53% among 2021 graduates.
- U.S. Census Bureau & Pew Research data show, all bachelor's degrees offered at the U including education, humanities and visual and performing arts, leads to a five-year post-graduate median salary that is considered middle-income in the state of Utah.






