SB161 – Sets Up a Process

1. Research and resolve the air-permit issues
2. Determine a fair market value for the assets
3. Identify qualified companies to acquire IPP

Passing SB161, and Governor signing SB161 sends clear message:

1. We need reliable base load power
2. New technologies allow for a bright and clean future for coal



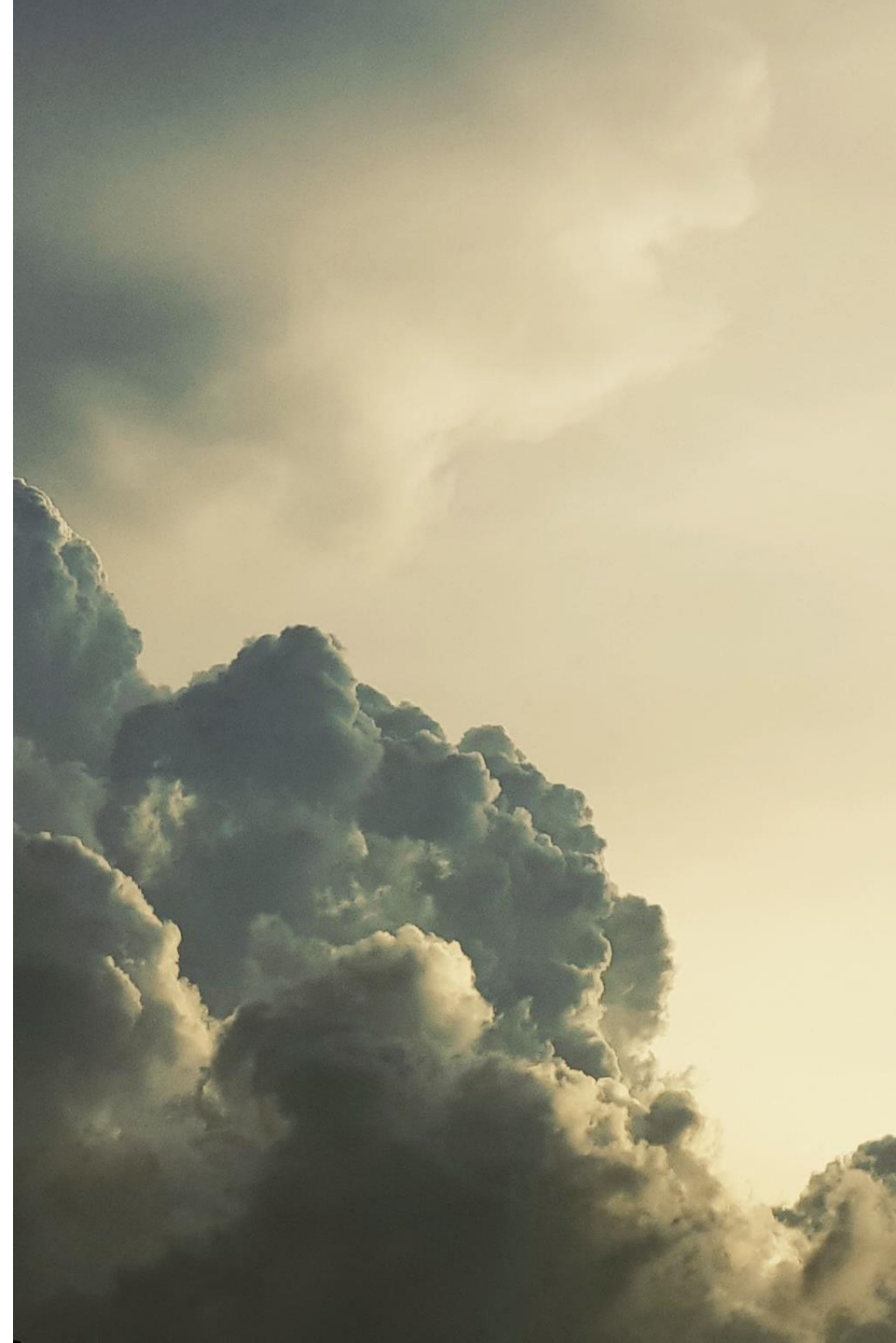
Utah Legislature & Governor Cox

SB161 – Pushing back on:

1. Politics of Southern California
2. Management & Staff at IPA
3. Massive legal and lobbying staff
4. Zero-sum game

The Sky is Falling?

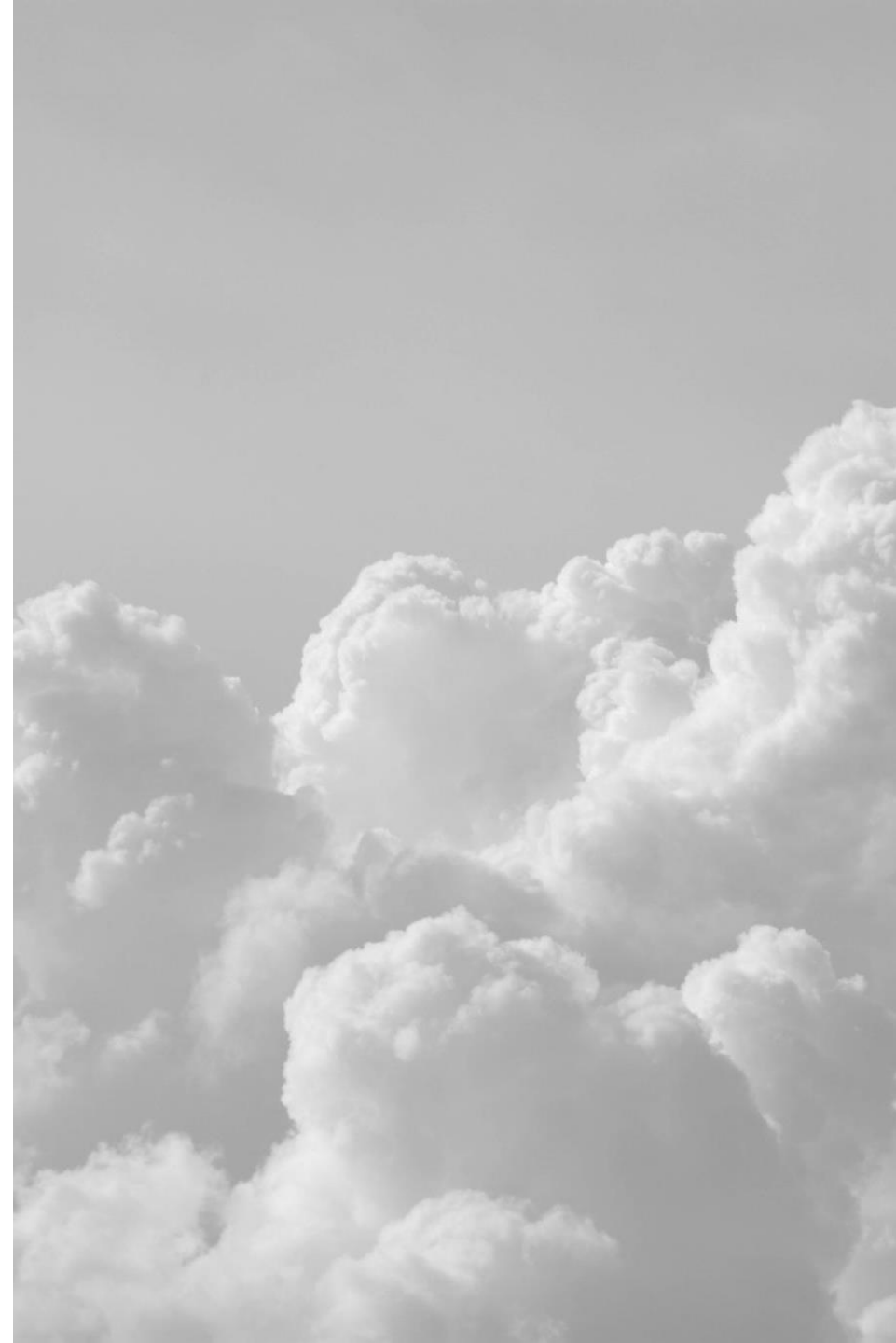

The Sky is Falling?

SB 161 causes significant harm to a multi-billion-dollar project

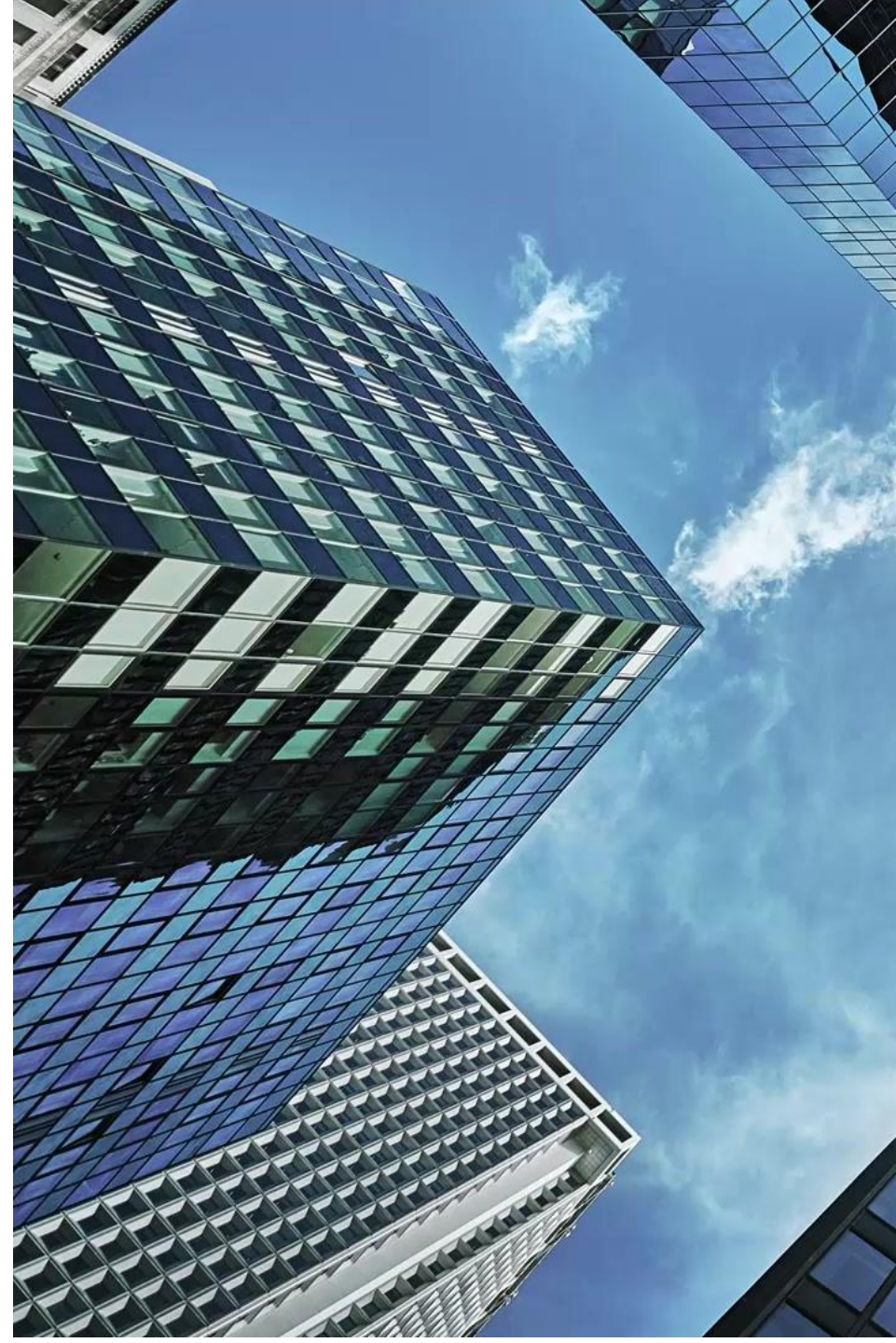
- Response:
 - Allows for a process to retain existing assets
 - Specifies no interference with IPP Renewed
 - Jackson Walker report indicates:
Environmental issues completely addressable
and non-threatening



The Sky is Falling?

SB 161 conflicts with enforceable commitments made to EPA by the State of Utah and IPA and, if implemented, will most certainly lead to EPA intervention and litigation that will frustrate the goals of the legislation and cost Utah millions of dollars in legal fees

- Response:
 - IPA is acting in concert with the EPA
 - IPA using the threat of EPA action like the Specter of Doom
 - Jackson Walker Report: safe, responsible and EPA compliant method to move forward





The Sky is Falling?

SB 161 does not provide any meaningful benefit to the State (it will not save any coal jobs)

- Response:
 - Preservation of IPP:
 - saved jobs at the IPP
 - economic development from power generated
 - Use Utah Coal
 - Save Utah Coal Jobs



The Sky is Falling?

- Response (cont.):
 - IPP consumes 5+ Million tons of coal per year
 - 30% + of Utah's coal production
 - Saves thousands of Utah jobs
 - Add thousands of additional jobs
 - Massive economic development
 - Reliable, cost-effective, baseload energy drives all economic development





The Sky is Falling?

SB 161 ignores meaningful efforts by IPA to work toward a win-win solution

- Response:
 - The IPA has met with the Utah Legislature and proposed realistic solutions, yet none of these offers have ever been fulfilled, which has forced the legislature to pass legislation to hold IPA to its promises

SB161 Timeline vs “Run Out the Clock”

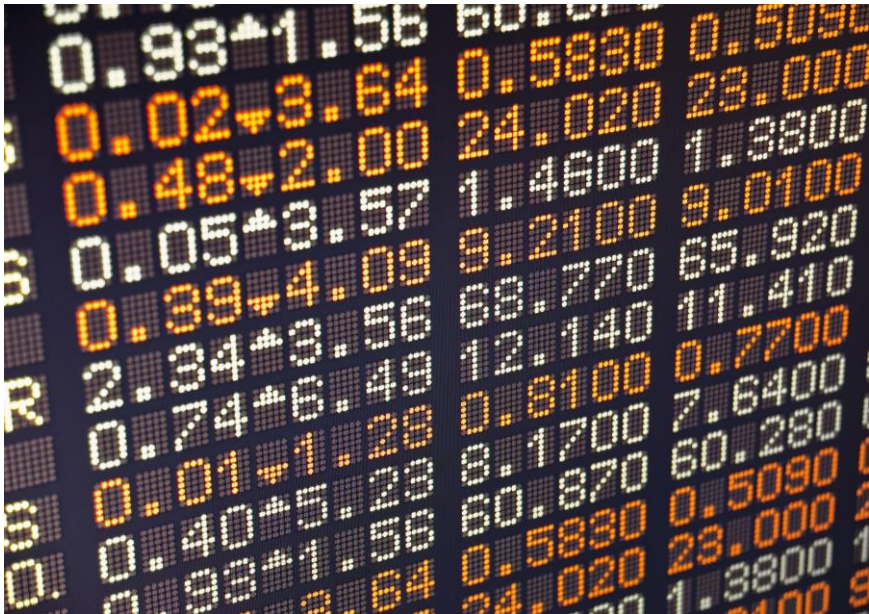
