

- Uvalde
 - Department of Justice debrief
 - After Action Review of incident command

- Swatting
 - According to the Texas School Safety Center:
 - Each incident costs \$100K
 - False threats cost K-12 schools more than \$82M
 - Non-monetary costs such as missed class time, trauma, and physical damages






- Behavioral Threat Assessment

 - Not a discipline plan



Takeaways

- School safety requires a comprehensive approach
- Understanding the pathways to violence will support prevention efforts
- Common language is critical to responsiveness
- Drill styles and expectations should align with current needs
- After action reviews are necessary for improved response
- Emergency Response Plans must be current and relevant
- Data should be considered in emergency response and prevention
- Highlighting best practices and community heroes
- Have a rotational chair on multidisciplinary teams
