School Safety: Suicide Prevention

According to the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) O ce of the Medical Examiner:

- 32 youth under the age of 18 have died by suicide in the irst 11 months of 2024.
- This count is slightly below the ve-year average.
- While 32 deaths is 32 too many, signs are pointing to fewer youth deaths in 2024 than is typical.
- This a positive sign and suggests that suicide prevention directed at youth is having an impact.

Utah State Board of Education Suicide Prevention

New Crisis Response Support Line monitored by Crisis Response Support Team (CRST) members.

Trainings provided include: PREPaRE School Crisis Prevention and Intervention training, Youth Mental Health First Aid (YMHFA), and Question, Persuade, Refer (QPR) Suicide Prevention Training.

New Canvas Course created for Suicide Prevention Training for Employees. 316 educators have taken the course so far.
