3 Sub HB 226: Criminal Amendments

WHAT THE BILL DOES:

- Increases the maximum penalty for Class A misdemeanors that are crimes against persons, which include offenses such as assault and sexual abuse of a minor, from 364 to 365 days. Applicable offenses also include DUI.
- Requires local law enforcement to refer illegal immigrants who are convicted of one of these offenses to ICE for deportation
- Directs judges to consider illegal immigrants and asylum seekers as flight risks in sentencing
- Imposes a civil penalty and fine of \$10,000 on non-profits who knowingly transport illegal immigrants into Utah.
- Requires courts to collect and report an inmate's immigration status to federal authorities.

THE FACTS

- Illegal immigrants make up an estimated 4.6% of Utah's prison population, costing the state nearly \$16 million per year.
- The majority of crimes
 committed by illegal
 immigrants who are in prison
 are sex offenses and murder.
- On the Jordan River Trail, more than half of all drugrelated felony offenses this year have been committed by illegal immigrants.
- In 2024, Utah law enforcement identified the presence of Tren de Aragua, a Venezuelan criminal gang involved in violent crimes, including sextortion, drug distribution, and attempted homicide. The group smuggles members across the southwest border and poses a growing threat to public safety in Utah.
