WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT AREAS

DWR owns and manages 149 WMAs across the state as Wildlife or Waterfowl Management Areas, totaling nearly 600,000 acres.

WMAs are owned and managed for:

- Conserving critical wildlife habitats
- Helping to minimize and mitigate wildlife damage on private property
- Providing places where Utahns can go to hunt, fish and enjoy wildlife-based recreation



FY25 WMA YEARLY MANAGEMENT BUDGET

 \$6,548,695 WMA operation and maintenance budget

• \$2,563,274 WMA infrastructure and one-time projects budget

This funding comes from license dollars and associated federal funds



WMA MANAGEMENT

- Costs are significant
- Many people, especially along the Wasatch Front, are using and enjoying these lands without contributing to the cost of management



H.B. 309 CHANGES TO WMA ACCESS


During the 2025 session, House Bill 309 was passed, which requires a person 18 or over to have a hunting, fishing, or combination license to enter a WMA in a county of the 1st or 2nd class

- Utah


This impacts a total of 30 WMAs



LICENSE FEES

 A fishing or hunting license for a Utah resident costs \$40, and it is good for 365 days after purchase

 In addition, each hunting license provides \$80.49 in federal matching funds to DWR, and each fishing license provides \$16.19 in federal matching funds to DWR



ESTIMATED REVENUE GENERATED

- DWR estimates that 300 new people may purchase a license due to this new requirement
- The additional revenue will go right back into WMA maintenance activities to keep the lands valuable for wildlife and useful to the public
