





# Prison Population Entry and Exit








# Prison Population Drivers

- → Steady annual prison population growth of approximately 2% (2010–2024)
  - Female population has higher annual fluctuations
  - July 2025 was the highest inmate count in the previous 2 years.
  - ◆ Current pace may be higher than 2%
  - Fluctuations have existed due to JRI and COVID
  - ◆ Upward pressure for last 14 years
- → Admissions exceed releases; inmates are staying in prison longer
  - Admissions and releases are trending down, admissions are outpacing releases
- → Sex offenders are nearly 40% of the population
- → Inmates with life sentence make up 29% of population
- → Approximately 60%-65% return to prison within 3 years (mostly technical violations)
- → Probation population has grown by 10% in last 2 years more than 1,000+





# Prison Population - Last 24 Months






# Prison Population Projections










### **UDC Preliminary Capacity Analysis**






"If UDC has to operate at or near its capacity, it will completely run out of beds by 2030, and by 2036 will have 798 more inmates in the system than its existing capacity." (CGL Report)




## With and without 5% bed vacancy rate



"...we recommend that projected bed needs include a 5 percent vacancy rate in addition to the projected average daily population. Maintaining a 5 percent capacity buffer above the average daily population would provide critical operational flexibility for a correctional system without significantly impacting the system budget. A 5 percent margin allows for safer and more appropriate inmate placement based on classification, health, and programmatic needs, rather than simply filling beds. It also enables facilities to better manage unexpected population spikes, conduct maintenance without disrupting housing, and respond to emergencies." (CGL - UDC Preliminary Capacity Analysis, Facility Master Plan Project, July 31, 2025)

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### **Current Community Correctional Center Capacity**








### Parole Trends - 24 Months

#### Average Daily Population - All Parolees (with Trend)






### **Probation Trends Overall**






### **Probation Trends - Last 24 Months**

#### Average Daily Population - Felony Probation (with Trend)




#### Average Daily Population - Misdemeanor Probation (with Trend)






### Current Efforts to Manage Prison Capacity


- → Housing efficiency within the prison
- → Earned time credit eligibility and ready release requests
- → Habitual offender supervision
- → Options in lieu of incarceration for appropriate candidates
  - Treatment, detox, GPS, etc.
- → AP&P prison recommendations review with chain of command
- → Parole Violator Program
- → Remain in county jail through IPP
- → Warrant and case review upon arrest
- Parole violator interviews

## Future Efforts to Manage Prison Capacity

- → Increased use of Parole Violator Program
  - Challenge with potential medical cost
- → Enhanced used of Community Correctional Centers
- → Potential for Behavioral Health Treatment Center to be built
  - Land has been purchased
- → Intelligence Reentry Intervention and Safety (IRIS) Center
- → Predictive analytics
- Prevention upon first arrest, before someone comes to prison or is formally placed under UDC supervision

# Legislative Awareness

- → 2024 & 2025 Legislation passed projects 177 new prison commitments over time
- → Additional Community Correctional Centers
  - ◆ BHTC
  - Parole violator center
- → More AP&P Agents and staff in CCCs
  - Example PSI Writers
- → For prison expansion, it makes the most sense to add on to the Central Utah Correctional Facility
