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(1) A third-party contractor shall use personally identifiable student data received under a

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31	contract with an education entity strictly for the purpose of providing the contracted
32	product or service within the negotiated contract terms.
33	(2)(a) When contracting with a third-party contractor, an education entity, or a
34	government agency contracting on behalf of an education entity, shall[-] :
35	(i) require the following provisions in the contract:
36	[(a)] (A) requirements and restrictions related to the collection, use, storage, or
37	sharing of student data by the third-party contractor that are necessary for the
38	education entity to ensure compliance with the provisions of this part and state

40	[(b)] (B) a description of a person, or type of person, including an affiliate of the
41	third-party contractor, with whom the third-party contractor may share studen

43	[(e)] (C) provisions that, at the request of the education entity, govern the deletion

83	contractor did not use student data, shared by or collected on behalf of an education
84	entity, to market the educational application or product;
85	(c) use a recommendation engine to recommend to a student:
86	(i) content that relates to learning or employment, within the third-party contractor's
87	application, if the recommendation is not motivated by payment or other
88	consideration from another party; or
89	(ii) services that relate to learning or employment, within the third-party contractor's
90	application, if the recommendation is not motivated by payment or other
91	consideration from another party;
92	[(d) respond to a student request for information or feedback, if the content of the
93	response is not motivated by payment or other consideration from another party;]
94	[(e)] (d) use student data to allow or improve operability and functionality of the
95	third-party contractor's application; or
96	[(f)] (e) identify for a student nonprofit institutions of higher education or scholarship
97	providers that are seeking students who meet specific criteria if the criteria does not
98	include a personal identity characteristic as that term is defined in Section 53B-1-118

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99	(i) regardless of whether the identified nonprofit institutions of higher education or
100	scholarship providers provide payment or other consideration to the third-party
101	contractor; and
102	(ii) only if the third-party contractor obtains authorization in writing from:
103	(A) a student's parent through the student's school or LEA; or

105	(5) At the completion of a contract with an education entity, if the contract has not been

107	request all personally identifiable student data under the control of the education entity

110	(6)(a) A third-party contractor may not:
111	(i) except as provided in Subsection (6)(b), sell student data;

115	(iii) use student data for targeted advertising.
116	(b) A person may obtain student data through the purchase of, merger with, or otherwise
