These reductions would have lasting effects on the stability, capacity, and effectiveness of sexual assault services statewide.

3,700+
victims would not receive services across all state-funded sexual assault programs.



In the next year, an estimated
30,000

victim services would not be provided. Many services supported by these funds are not fully captured in existing data systems, as programs report essential services while numerous impactful, survivor-centered supports are not easily quantifiable.
