

This bill will generate approximately \$63,000 annually from new registration fees, deposited to the General Fund. In addition, collections from applicants for the criminal background check will generate \$86,400 in FY 2001 and \$22,400 in FY 2002, which is passed on to the Department of Public Safety for the costs of the checks.

The bill changes the emphasis from on-site inspections to the registrants' reporting of compliance. It is estimated that the net switch in personnel and associated implementation costs will require an appropriation of \$26,500 in FY 2001, and will result in a savings of \$3,000 thereafter.

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**Individual and Business Impact**

Approximately 1,800 child care providers will be required to register with the Department of Health. This will require them to pay the annual \$35.00 registration fee. In addition, each registrant will be required to pay for a criminal background check the first time they apply for registration. This fee is \$24.00.

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
