SHORT TITLE: Ignition Interlock System Amendments

STATE GOVERNMENT (UCA 36-12-13(2)(b))

Enactment of this bill will cost the Department of Public Safety Driver License Division \$140,500 one-time from the Transportation Fund Restricted - Department of Public Safety Restricted Account in FY 2012, \$147,600 in FY 2013, and \$140,600 ongoing beginning FY 2014. The bill will increase state revenues to the Transportation Fund Restricted - Department of Public Safety Restricted Account within the Department of Public Safety Driver License Division by \$192,200 annually beginning FY 2013.

LOCAL GOVERNMENTS (UCA 36-12-13(2)(c))

Enactment of this bill likely will not result in direct, measurable costs for local governments.

DIRECT EXPENDITURES BY UTAH RESIDENTS AND BUSINESSES (UCA 36-12-13(2)(d))

Ignition interlock providers and installers will be required to become certified to operate in Utah and will pay the \$100 and \$30 fees for provider and installer certifications respectively. There are 10 providers and 53 installers and the fees they pay annually will amount to \$2,600 in state revenues beginning FY 2013. There will be 12,641 suspensions annually beginning FY 2013. It is anticipated that 50% will pay the reinstatement fee, generating \$189,600 in state revenues beginning FY 2013. Drivers who become Ignition Interlock Restricted Drivers as defined in 41-6a-518.2 will be required to have an Ignition Interlock System installed in their vehicle to reinstate their driver license and will pay an upfront installation fee of approximately \$75 and monthly maintenance fees to the provider of approximately \$75 per month for a period of 18 months to 3 years, depending on the type of offense.
