UCA 36-12-13(2)(b)

Enacting this bill could increase the number of violators and applicable fines. The state could collect between \$30 and \$45 per applicable citation. State revenue to the General Fund could increase by \$3,600 annually beginning FY 2016.

UCA 36-12-13(2)(c)

Increased revenue to local governments could amount to \$23,600 annually beginning in FY 2016.

Individuals & Businesses

UCA 36-12-13(2)(d)

This bill could increase the amount of violators and applicable citation fines and surcharges. About 1,800 convicted individuals could pay a total of \$27,000 more annually (\$3,400 in state revenue and \$27,600 in local government revenue) beginning FY 2016.
