Enactment of this bill may cost the State Board of Education \$421,000 one-time and \$130,000 ongoing from the Education Fund to implement the American Civics Education Initiative outlined in the bill. One-time costs identified by the Utah State Office of Education (USOE) include converting test questions to an online platform, linking multiple test results to state data systems, altering state student transcripts, reporting and storing data, and developing an alternative assessment for students with disabilities. The USOE estimated the per-student cost to deliver and maintain the test at \$2 to \$5. Assuming a \$3 cost, it would cost would cost \$130,000 to deliver the test to the 43,298 12th graders in the state.

Enactment of this bill may require additional costs in local education agencies to update data systems and administer tests. For students with disabilities, the Utah State Office of Education estimates that it may cost approximately \$78 per student to administer an alternative assessment for students with the most cognitive disabilities, or approximately \$31,200 statewide.
