Enactment of this bill requires the State Board of Education to establish nutrition standards for food served in Utah schools. Depending on how Utah's standards relate to the minimum standards adopted by the United States Department of Agriculture, the State may see a reduction in federal funding between \$0 and \$145 million for child nutrition programs due to non compliance with the federal standards. Legislative General Counsel has attached a Legislative Review Note to this bill. If provisions in the bill are challenged in court, there will be costs associated with defending those provisions.

UCA 36-12-13(2)(c) Local Government

Local education agencies (LEAs) that do not meet federal minimum nutrition requirements may see a reduction in federal funding for child nutrition programs. The amount of federal funding supporting child nutrition programs in the state is approximately \$145 million. Amounts allocated to LEAs will vary depending on the number of meals served and how many of those meals meet free or reduced-price lunch qualifications.

Notes on Notes
