Enactment of this legislation could increase workers compensation premiums to municipalities and fire districts beginning in FY16. The Labor Commission collects fees on workers compensation premiums and could realize a small increase in revenue which is indeterminable at this time.

Enactment of this legislation could increase workers compensation premiums but the impact on state expenditures will likely be immaterial due to the small number of state-employed firefighters.

Enactment of this legislation could increase the likelihood that firefighters obtain compensation for contracting certain cancers from occupational exposure. Municipalities and fire districts could be assessed higher workers compensation premiums; municipalities and fire districts that are self-insured could need to budget for additional claims.

Notes on Notes
