Enactment of this legislation may increase revenues to the State Parks Fees Restricted Account if the Division of Parks and Recreation determines that the Little Sahara State Park would be financially self-sustaining and the United States Bureau of Land Management agrees to transfer, sell, or lease the land to the Division of Parks and Recreation, and the Legislative Management Committee and the Natural Resources, Agriculture, and Environment Committee approve the plan to expand the state park system.

Enactment of this legislation may increase the costs to the Division of Parks and Recreation from the State Parks Fees Restricted Account for capital improvements and operations of the Little Sahara State Park if the division determines that the new park will be financially self sustaining, the United States Bureau of Land Management agrees to transfer, sell, or lease the land to the Division of Parks and Recreation, and the Legislative Management Committee and the Natural Resources, Agriculture, and Environment Committee approve the plan to expand the state park system. The costs for the initial assessments of the profitability of the proposal can be handled with the division's existing resources.
