Public Benefit:

Purpose: This bill creates the Opiate Overdose Outreach Pilot Program within the Department of Health and authorizes grants from the program, specifies how grants may be used, requires annual reporting by grantees, requires rulemaking by the Department of Health

Services: The grantees may pay for the purchase of an opiate antagonist or pay for the cost of providing training on the proper administration of an opiate antagonist in response to an opiate-related drug overdose event.

Expected Outcome: The expected outcome is to reduce opioid drug overdose deaths.

Implementations and Resources: The bill will be implemented by the Utah Department of Health Violence and Injury Prevention Program.

How: Funds will be granted through the program who may be in a position to assist an individual who is at increased risk of experiencing an opiate-related drug overdose event to pay for the purchase of an opiate antagonist or pay for the cost of providing training on the proper administration of an opiate antagonist in response to an opiate-related drug overdose event.

Performance Measures

Goal

Title: Decreased opioid overdose deaths.

Description: We hope to reach this overarching goal through expanding naloxone initiatives by increasing the availability of an opiate antagonist and increasing training on the proper administration of an opiate antagonist in response to an overdose event. Preliminatry data in 2014 show that 290 Utahns died as a result of a prescription opioid overdose. Over the next two years, we hope to decrease the number of presription opioid overdoses by 15%.

Collection Method: The data for this performance measure will be collected by tracking the number of prescription opioid deaths. The number of grantees using funds to purchase naloxone and the number of kits dispensed and lives saved.
