This bill appropriates \$500,000 ongoing and \$500,000 one-time General Fund in FY 2017 to the Department of Health for grants to persons who may be in a position to assist an individual who is at increased risk of experiencing an opiate-related drug overdose event. The Legislation may cost the Department of Health \$46,600 ongoing General Fund beginning in FY 2017 for a 0.4 full-time equivalent position and \$10,400 one-time General Fund in FY 2017 to set up and administer the Opiate Overdose Outreach Pilot Program.
