UCA 36-12-13(2)(d)

Between May 2016 and July 2018, enactment of this legislation could cause health benefit plans and hospitals to be responsible for more medical costs for workers" compensation-related injuries and disease than is currently the case; workers" compensation insurers, self-insured employers, and individuals could be responsible for less. The extent of this impact would depend on existing and future cost-sharing arrangements, health and workers" compensation benefit plan structures, and the terms of various contracts; it cannot be determined at this time.
