Enactment of this legislation could cost the Department of Human Services - Division of Substance Abuse and Mental Health \$43,300 General Fund and \$13,700 from federal Medicaid transfers ongoing beginning in FY 2019 to provide additional retirement benefits to special function officers working at the Utah State Hospital who could become eligible for the Public Safety Retirement System. The department has indicated it can absorb these costs in its existing budget.
