Enactment of this bill could cost the Commission on Criminal and Juvenile Justice \$199,100 one-time in FY 2019 from the General Fund in grant money to fund the costs of two attorneys in two northern Utah prosecutor offices. This bill could also cost the Commission on Criminal and Juvenile Justice \$6,000 one-time in FY 2019 from the General Fund to create, administer, and write rules for the grant. The Commission on Criminal and Juvenile Justice has indicated it can absorb the creating, administrating, and rule writing costs in its existing budget.
