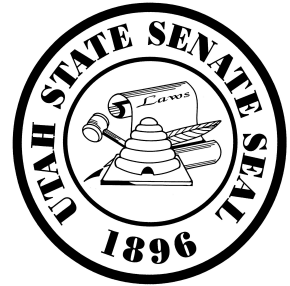

Enactment of this legislation likely will not materially impact state revenue.
