Enactment of this legislation likely will not materially impact state revenue.

Enactment of this legislation could cost the Department of Health \$5,000 one-time from the General Fund in FY 2019 to update and distribute new forms and program data systems, and \$1,000 ongoing beginning in FY 2019 to monitor compliance with new reporting standards. The Department of Health indicates it can absorb these costs. Enactment of this bill could also cost the Department of Health \$20,000 one-time from the General Fund for website development by the Department of Technology Services, \$7,000 one-time from the General Fund for writing website content, and printing, mailing, and translation of forms, and \$11,300 ongoing from the General Fund for website maintenance and program personnel costs.
