New Services or Benefit

Public Benefit:

Purpose: Increase services available to individuals eligible for the primary care network.

Services: Inpatient hospital, medical specialty care, diagnostic testing, and behavioral health services to individuals on the primary care network.

Expected Outcome: All PCN parents will become eligible for the expanded services, and PCN adults without dependent children will become eligible if funding is available. This coverage would reduce uncompensated care.

Implementations and Resources: The Department of Health (UDOH) will add new benefits to the amended 1115 PCN waiver. Claims payment will be made through MMIS (and then PRISM when it is implemented).

How: When UDOH pays claims, medical providers will receive reimbursement for newly eligible services. When medical providers are reimbursed for services that previously had been provided as uncompensated care, uncompensated care will be reduced.

Performance Measures

Goal

Title: PCN access to Mental Health services.

Description: PCN clients will gain access to Mental Health services. Within 1 year, the PCN Mental Health service rate will reach the minimum 12-month experience from the comparison population, Parent/Caretaker Relatives (PCR). Within 2 years, the PCN Mental Health service rate will reach the median 12-month experience from the comparison population, PCR. Measured in visits/1,000 enrolled.

Collection Method: Mental Health claims and encounters will be queried from the data warehouse. Number of PCN enrollees will be queried from the data warehouse.
