UCA 36-12-13(2)(b)

Enactment of this bill could decrease the year-end transfers to the General Fund from the Commerce Service Account by \$600 annually beginning in FY 2019. Additionally, this legislation may increase the revenue to the Commerce Service Account by \$1,000 annually beginning in FY 2019.

This bill appropriates \$9,300 one-time General Fund to the Department of Health in FY 2019 distribute pamphlets to over 550 pharmacies statewide. Additionally, enactment of this legislation may cost the Department of Health from the General Fund \$3,500 in FY 2018 and \$4,200 ongoing beginning in FY 2019 to develop a pamphlet. Further, this legislation may cost the Department of Commerce \$1,600 ongoing from the Commerce Service Account beginning in FY 2019 for 40 hours of staff time to complete approximately two investigations annually. Spending from the Commerce Service Account impacts the year-end transfer to the General Fund. The Department of Health has indicated that it can absorb the following General Fund impacts: (1) \$3,500 one-time in FY 2018 and (2) \$4,200 ongoing beginning in FY 2019.

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Local Government

UCA 36-12-13(2)(c)

Enactment of this legislation likely will not result in direct, measurable costs for local governments.

Individuals & Businesses

UCA 36-12-13(2)(d)

Pharmacies statewide may spend about \$11,000 annually to affix approximately 2.2 million labels to Schedule II or Schedule III controlled substances prescriptions that are opiates. About two pharmacies annually that are not in compliance with the new labeling requirements may be subject to fines of approximately \$500 each for a total impact of \$1,000.

Regulatory Impact

UCA 36-12-13(2)(e)

Enactment of this legislation could result in a medium increase in the regulatory burden for Utah residents or businesses.
