UCA 36-12-13(2)(c)

Enactment of this bill could result in a loss of \$2,700 in revenue each even year election cycle beginning in FY 2022 for local counties and municipalities from state school board candidates no longer paying a filing fee.

Individuals & Businesses

UCA 36-12-13(2)(d)

Enactment of this bill could save an estimated 41 State School Board of Education candidates, who no longer pay filing fees, \$65 each fee equaling a state rounded total of \$2,700.

Regulatory Impact

Enactment of this legislation likely will not change the regulatory burden for Utah residents or businesses.

Notes on Notes
