Local Government

Enactment of this legislation could cost Salt Lake City the increased value of the property tax differential that will be generated within the boundaries of the Inland Port for an additional 15 years past the 25 years currently in statute. These funds would be collected by the Authority. Enactment would also allow the Utah Inland Port Authority to receive 50% of local sales and use tax revenue collected from transactions involving construction materials transported from out of state and delivered within a project area under the Authority's jurisdiction.

Enactment of this legislation likely will not result in direct expenditures from tax or fee changes for Utah residents and businesses.

Regulatory Impact

Enactment of this legislation likely will not change the regulatory burden for Utah residents or businesses.
