Enactment of this legislation could cost the Legislature \$165,000 from the General Fund one-time in FY 2020 for video hardware, computer hardware and software, and contractor installation costs to broadcast legislative meetings by both audio and video. Staff time for installation and configuration could cost the Legislature approximately \$10,800 from the General Fund one-time in FY 2020, which can be absorbed in existing budgets. Enactment of this legislation could also cost the Legislature \$120 per hour for ADA closed captioning of the video, at a cost of \$120 per hour for approximately 1,000 hours per year, totaling \$120,000 ongoing from the General Fund. Because this bill takes effect on May 1, 2020, almost all of the closed captioning costs would occur in FY 2021.
