Enactment of this legislation appropriates \$100,000 one time, from the General Fund to the new Municipal Incorporation Expendable Special Revenue Fund in FY 2020.

This bill appropriates \$100,000 one-time, from the General Fund to the Municipal Incorporation Expendable Special Revenue Fund in FY 2020 for consultant expenditures related to municipal incorporation. This fund will be managed by the Lieutenant Governor"s Office. The Lieutenant Governor"s Office could utilize \$40,000 of these funds per year to support municipalities based on historical context. Incorporating municipalities would be responsible for reimbursing the fund within five years for any costs related to incorporation expended on their behalf.
