Enactment of this legislation could generate \$20,000 ongoing in Dedicated Credits for the Department of Environmental Quality starting in FY 2021 from hourly fees associated with generating spot forecasts for open burn permittees.

Enactment of this legislation could cost the Department of Environmental Quality \$869,100 in FY2021 and \$434,600 in FY2022 from the General Fund to revise two air quality rules, amend 8 sections of 4 State Implementations Plans (SIPs), revise 20 open burn permits, and complete administrative work.

Enactment of this legislation likely will not result in direct, measurable costs for local governments.

Individuals & Businesses

UCA 36-12-13(2)(d)

Enactment of this legislation could cost land managers who have a permit for burning the fully burdened hourly DEQ rate of \$100 per hour to submit a request to the National Weather Service to generate a spot forecast.

Regulatory Impact

UCA 36-12-13(2)(e)

Enactment of this legislation likely will not change the regulatory burden for Utah residents or businesses.
