If enacted, this legislation could reduce dedicated credits to the the Division of Water Quality by (\$155,600) in FY 2020, (\$622,300) in FY 2021, and (\$466,700) in FY 2022 from the elimination of stormwater permits fees for construction sites.

Enactment of this legislation could cost the Division of Water Quality \$767,200 one-time over three years beginning in FY 2020 from the General Fund to conduct a study of the need for, and best practices of, storm water containment during construction. The Division of Water Quality could see reduced personnel costs of (\$155,600) in FY 2020, (\$622,300) in FY 2021, and (\$466,700) in FY 2022 from not issuing stormwater permits for construction.

Local Government

UCA 36-12-13(2)(c)

Enactment of this legislation could reduce revenues up to (\$33,000) per year to the 88 Municipal Separate Storm Sewer Systems in Utah which currently charge fees to inspection permitted construction sites. Cities and counties which currently manage Stormwater Discharges from Construction Activities could see savings on personnel costs from reduced workload associated with no longer inspecting permitted construction sites.

Individuals & Businesses

UCA 36-12-13(2)(d)

Enactment of this legislation could reduce costs by \$150 for each businesses not having to apply for a stormwater permit for construction. If passed, costs for businesses could be reduced by (\$155,600) in FY 2020, (\$622,300) in FY 2021, and (\$466,700) in FY 2022.

Regulatory Impact

UCA 36-12-13(2)(e)

Enactment of this legislation could result in a medium reduction in the regulatory burden for Utah residents or businesses.
