Enactment of this bill could generate an estimated \$60,200 one-time in FY 2021 and \$17,000 ongoing beginning in FY 2021 in revenue to the Crime and Violence Prevention Fund for the Attorney General's Office from local governments to fund the Drug Disposal Program. To the extent that the repositories require a solution refill, the Attorney General's Office could collect \$525 per refill per repository to the Crime and Violence Prevention Fund from local governments.

Enactment of this bill could cost the Attorney General"s Office \$17,000 ongoing beginning in FY 2021 from the Crime and Violence Prevention Fund to administer the Drug Disposal Program required in the bill. The bill could also cost the Attorney General"s Office an estimated \$60,200 one-time from the Crime and Violence Prevention Fund in FY 2021 to pass through to local governments to fund drug disposal repositories. To the extent that the repositories require a solution refill, it could cost the Attorney General"s Office \$525 per refill per repository from the Crime and Violence Prevention Fund to local governments. The bill could cost the Department of Environmental Quality \$6,000 one-time in FY 2021 and \$7,500 ongoing beginning in FY 2021 from the Environmental Quality Restricted Account to coordinate with the Attorney General"s Office and determine the controlled substance as rendered environmentally friendly. The Department of Environmental Quality has indicated it can absorb these costs in its existing budget.

Enactment of this bill could cost local governments an estimated \$60,200 one-time and \$17,000 ongoing in FY 2021 to fund the Drug Disposal Program. To the extent that the repositories require a solution refill, it could cost local government \$525 per refill per repository and disposal costs of used material in an unknown amount.
