Enactment of this legislation may cost the Department of Health one-time from the General Fund \$257,100 in FY 2020 for staff time to request certification for the importation of prescription drugs. Based upon an initial review, the bill may also cost the department \$113,500 ongoing beginning in FY 2021 for administration and may save the Public Employees Health Program \$2.6 million in prescription drug costs, of which \$1.4 million is General/Education Funds.
