Enactment of this bill may reduce eligible companies' sales tax liability by \$500,000 one-time in FY 2022. Companies failing to certify may be subject to a \$500,000 one-time penalty in addition to any sales tax liability.

Regulatory Impact

UCA 36-12-13(2)(d)

Enactment of this legislation likely will not change the regulatory burden for Utah residents or businesses.
